Laugh at all times of day. In the morning when the world is just waking up. Late at night under the stars. Along a busy city street at noon-time.

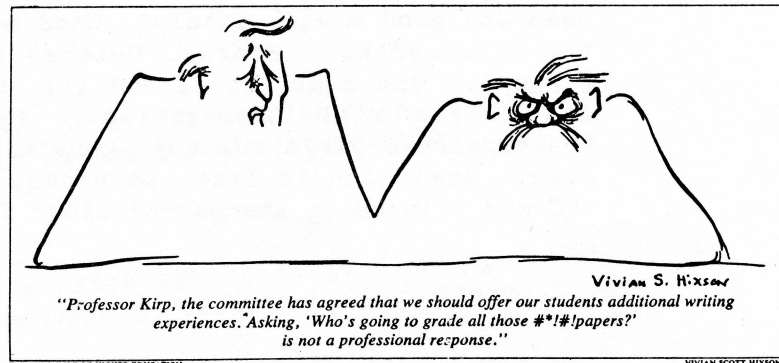

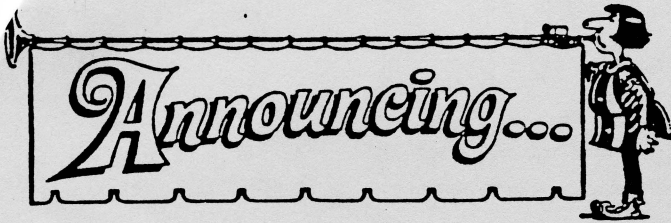
Laugh alone also, but if with a companion, choose one who appreciates the secret of laughter.

**SPRING, 1989 GRADUATE COURSE ON WRITING AND PUBLISHING
IN HIGHER EDUCATION (EDHE 6500)**

For those who need or want to publish their writing, this course offered by the University of North Texas in cooperation with Collin County Community College is a MUST. Publishing in Higher Education provides an honest, practical overview of the publishing world and the odds you face as a writer. More important, the course will tell you what you can do about it. You will be pleasantly surprised at how many straight answers the course offers about non-fiction writing and publishing. What are the differences between literary works that do get published and those that are turned down? How can you creatively and productively deal with rejection shock? How can you get materials published which you routinely use in courses you teach? What can publication mean in terms of your career and prestige? What financial rewards can you expect?

PUBLISHING IN HIGHER EDUCATION will deal with the major issues and problems affecting academic, non-fiction publishing. Among the topics to be covered are: copyrights, writing book reviews, the psychology and economics of writing; converting term papers, theses, and dissertations into publishable articles (even books); the editorial policies and practices of journals; book publishing; and much more.

ABOUT THE PROFESSOR . . .

Dr. Barry Lumsden, Professor of Higher Education at the University of North Texas will teach the course. Dr. Lumsden is Executive Editor of the COMMUNITY/JUNIOR COLLEGE QUARTERLY OF RESEARCH AND PRACTICE, Editor of EDUCATIONAL GERONTOLOGY: AN INTERNATIONAL BIMONTHLY and consulting Editor to READING PSYCHOLOGY and DEATH STUDIES. He has published numerous books and scores of articles which have appeared in major journals around the world.
