AACJC FELLOWS PROGRAM BRIEF

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF COMMUNITY AND JUNIOR COLLEGES

WHAT IS IT?

The AACJC Fellows Program, established in 1986, is an exciting professional development opportunity available for interested community, technical, and junior college staff at AACJC member institutions. Each fellowship will last a minimum of three months, but no more than one year. Each person selected to be an AACJC Fellow can participate in enriching learning experiences to include one or more of the following professional settings:

- With AACJC or another higher education association in Washington, D.C.
- With an AACJC member president in an institutional setting
- With a state director of community, technical, and junior colleges
- Conducting independent research
- Congressional internship

In addition, each Fellow selected is **required** to spend the first week of participation at the AACJC office in Washington, D.C. for orientation. Applications for participation in the 1989 AACJC Fellows Program are being accepted now. Applications must be received at AACJC at least four months prior to the anticipated date to begin the program. No more than four AACJC Fellows will be approved for participation during 1989. AACJC will assume major responsibility for placing approved Fellows in appropriate professional settings.

WHO CAN APPLY?

Any full-time professional employee at an AACJC member institution is invited to apply. Each applicant must submit a written statement from his/her institution that confirms that leave has been approved (or will be approved) during the proposed dates of participation in the Fellows Program. AACJC will provide one roundtrip air fare from the Fellow's residence to Washington, D.C., plus \$100 per month for incidental expenses. Salary, housing expenses, or other individual costs while participating in the Fellows Program will **not** be provided by AACJC.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

1. Complete the application form (see reverse side) and return it to AACJC with required back-up materials at least four months prior to the date that participation as a Fellow is anticipated to begin.
2. Applications will be reviewed by the AACJC executive staff and decisions announced to each applicant at least three months prior to the Fellow's anticipated date to begin the program.
3. Persons selected to participate will be required to write an evaluation of his/her participation in the Fellows Program. This will be due at AACJC no later than six weeks after the participation ends.
