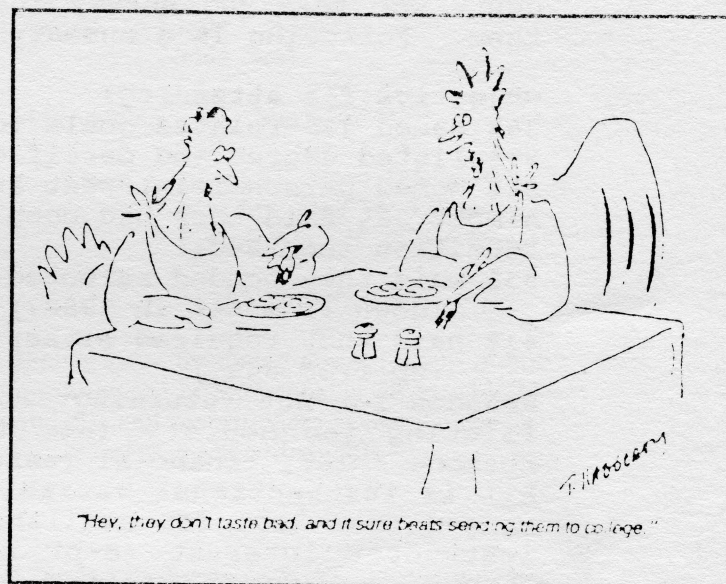

NONRETURNING 1988-89 VOC-TEC STUDENTS: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The fourth annual survey of nonreturning voc/tec students was conducted in Spring 1990. Surveys were sent to students who had enrolled in voc/tec courses during the 1988-89 academic year but who failed to return for the Fall 1989 semester. Of 647 students who received survey instruments, about 22% (142) returned them. Following is a summary of the results.

Objective for attending:

36% named job-related goals (down from 44% in 1988.)
35% listed degree and certification goals (up from 23%.)
21% named personal interest and development (28% in 1988.)
Almost 38% said they had completed their goals.

Education required:

53% said they needed selected courses to meet their objectives (down from 64% in 1988.)
41% said they required either associate degrees or certificates (up from 34%.)

Reasons for not returning: completed needed courses - 24%; conflicting job hours - 16%; transferred - 12%; personal/family reasons - 10%; financial reasons - 7%.

All 13 instructional variables were rated positively. Ratings ranged from 3.54 for availability of needed courses to 4.32 for instructor interest (5-pt scale.) Other factors rated 4 or higher: usefulness of courses in major, quality of instruction, class size, grading/testing, and quality and quantity of equipment.

College Services: 14 out of 17 college services were rated on the positive side of a 5-point scale. The top five were: library (4.15); bookstore (3.89); learning labs (3.76); career planning (3.65); and registrar's office (3.65).

Benefits of educational experience at CCCCD: Factors rated highest were cognitive in nature: pursuing additional education, learning on my own, and improving my thinking skills.

Employment

60% of the respondents rated availability of jobs in their chosen field as good or very good.

88% were employed.

81% started working before they took courses at CCCCD

70% were somewhat satisfied or very satisfied with their current salary.

58% took courses at CCCCD related to their present job.

Of those who had jobs not related to course work, almost one-third said this was because they were not yet sufficiently qualified.
