## **"Making a Difference" Human Relations Task Force**

No need to!

Psychologists now say that anyone who will learn and master certain formulas for dealing with others can quickly master this same form of skill. One psychologist, in defending his formula, calls it the *Magic 11*. It has eleven parts:

1. Freely admit your shortcomings. When the fault is yours, or you have blundered, take the blame.
2. Freely forgive those who err and trespass against you.
3. Cooperate willingly and cheerfully with others. Get in and pitch because nobody likes a holdback.
4. Whenever someone does you a favor - no matter how trivial - be grateful. Express your appreciation.
5. Treat others with consideration, respect, courtesy. Make them feel loved, wanted, important.
6. When the other fellow is wrong and you have to correct it, be careful that you do it tactfully, gracefully, and in a friendly way.
7. When someone is in trouble and you can help, give him genuine consideration and sympathy and help whenever you can.
8. Appreciate your friends - and show it.
9. Be moderate in your language - use smiles and words whenever possible.

11. Seek your own in another's good.

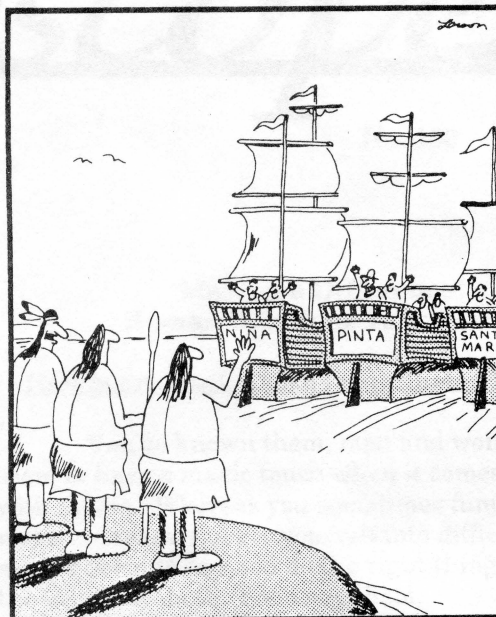

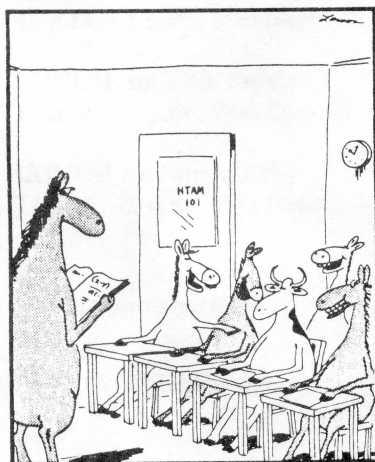

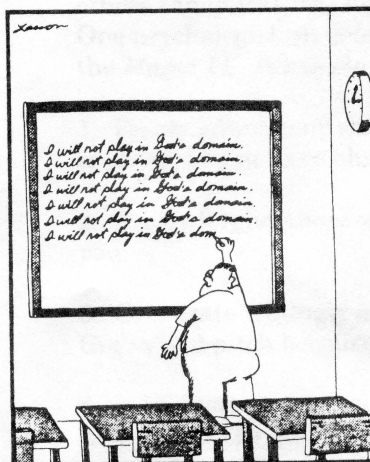
