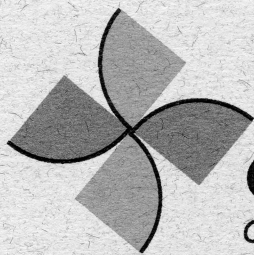
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## Board Approves Bond Sale, Master Plan

The CCCC Board of Trustees approved the sale of \$4.5 million consolidated fund revenue bonds during their regular meeting Tuesday, Oct. 22, thus providing funds for the expansion of Central Campus.

Consolidated fund revenue bonds are a new method of funding revenue bonds in which a number of resources can be pooled to pay off the bonds. A large portion of the bonds will be paid through the \$3 per credit hour building use fee, which is expected to produce \$500,000 a year.

The trustees also were presented with a master plan for Central Campus developed by JPJ Architects and Sasaki Associates. The master plan will be used to guide future decisions about campus planning and development at Central Campus, including the new addition.

The new addition could be bid as soon as February with construction beginning as soon as March.

The master plan is based on building additions to the existing structure in small phases. It suggests utilizing Jean's Creek, which runs through the property, as an essential element in the design and arrangement of buildings. The plan calls for placing buildings in close proximity to the creek on both the east and west sides, creating a large central outdoor space which will become the center of campus life.

Buildings suggested in the master plan include those for student services, Learning Resources Center, a student center, a fitness center, fire science and law enforcement, and a community center.

A limited number of copies of the master plan for Central Campus are available in the President's office on Central Campus. Faculty and staff members are encouraged to stop by and see the plan and offer comments.

## The Holocaust—It Must Not Be Forgotten

*Michael Jacobs: A Biographical Sketch*

Michael Jacobs was born in the small Polish town of Konin.

On Sept. 1, 1939, Poland was invaded by the Nazi army. Two months later, Mike and his entire family were herded into cattle cars and moved to the ghetto in Ostrowiec. His parents, two brothers and two sisters were murdered in the Treblinka death camp. A third brother was killed while fighting the Nazis with the partisans. Mike estimates that he lost 80 relatives as a result of the Holocaust.

Mike was sent from Camp Ostrowiec to Auschwitz (Oswiecim), Birkenau (Poland) and Mauthausen-Gusen II in Austria, where he was liberated on May 5, 1945.

Refusing to remain in a displaced persons camp, Mike worked as a shopkeeper, studied physical education and taught sports to both Jewish refugee and German children until receiving his papers to immigrate to the United States in 1951.

Mike has volunteered extensively as a lecturer on the Holocaust and has appeared before high schools, churches, civic groups and universities. He is founder and past president of the Holocaust Survivors in Dallas. Mike is also founder of the Dallas Memorial Center for Holocaust Studies located at 7900 Northaven Road which is dedicated to the memory of the 11 million souls (six million Jews and five million non-Jews) who perished at the hands of the Nazis.

Mike met and married a native Dallasite, Ginger Chesnick. They have four children and four grandchildren all residing in Dallas. Mike is the owner of Jacobs Iron and Metal Company, Inc.

## CCTEP News

One of the key elements of getting and keeping a job is the opportunity to obtain training, whether it's re-training, upgrading of skills or beginning a new career. Many people do not have the choice of careers upon reaching adulthood because they must support a family or feel the need to go to work right after high school graduation.

Collin County Training & Employment Program (CCTEP) offers a variety of training options based upon each participant's individual employment plan. CCCC is a major resource to this program by providing multiple options for these participants through both academic and non-credit programs. Especially helpful is CCCC's capability of customizing a course to meet student needs.

One such opportunity came to CCTEP participants between summer school sessions when 30 people were able to brush up on office skills because of the college's ability to develop customized educational programs. The Enterprise Division assisted CCTEP by creating a two-week short course called General Office Procedures. The course was designed for women wishing to return to the workforce and who had not worked in an office setting for several years.

The course included an introduction to typing, filing, business writing, office equipment and procedures, and an introduction to computers along with tips on a professional appearance. Several students were interviewed and all commented that the course opened new windows for learning. Almost 50 percent decided to take additional course work at CCCC. Others have obtained employment as a result of this confidence-building experience.
