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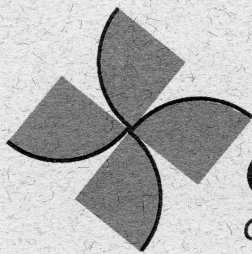

An average of 70–80 units are usually donated per day at Spring Creek Campus blood drives, where approximately 2/3 of CCCC students are enrolled. With approximately 1/3 of CCCC's total enrollment, Central Park Campus students and staff donate an average of 35 pints daily during blood drives. 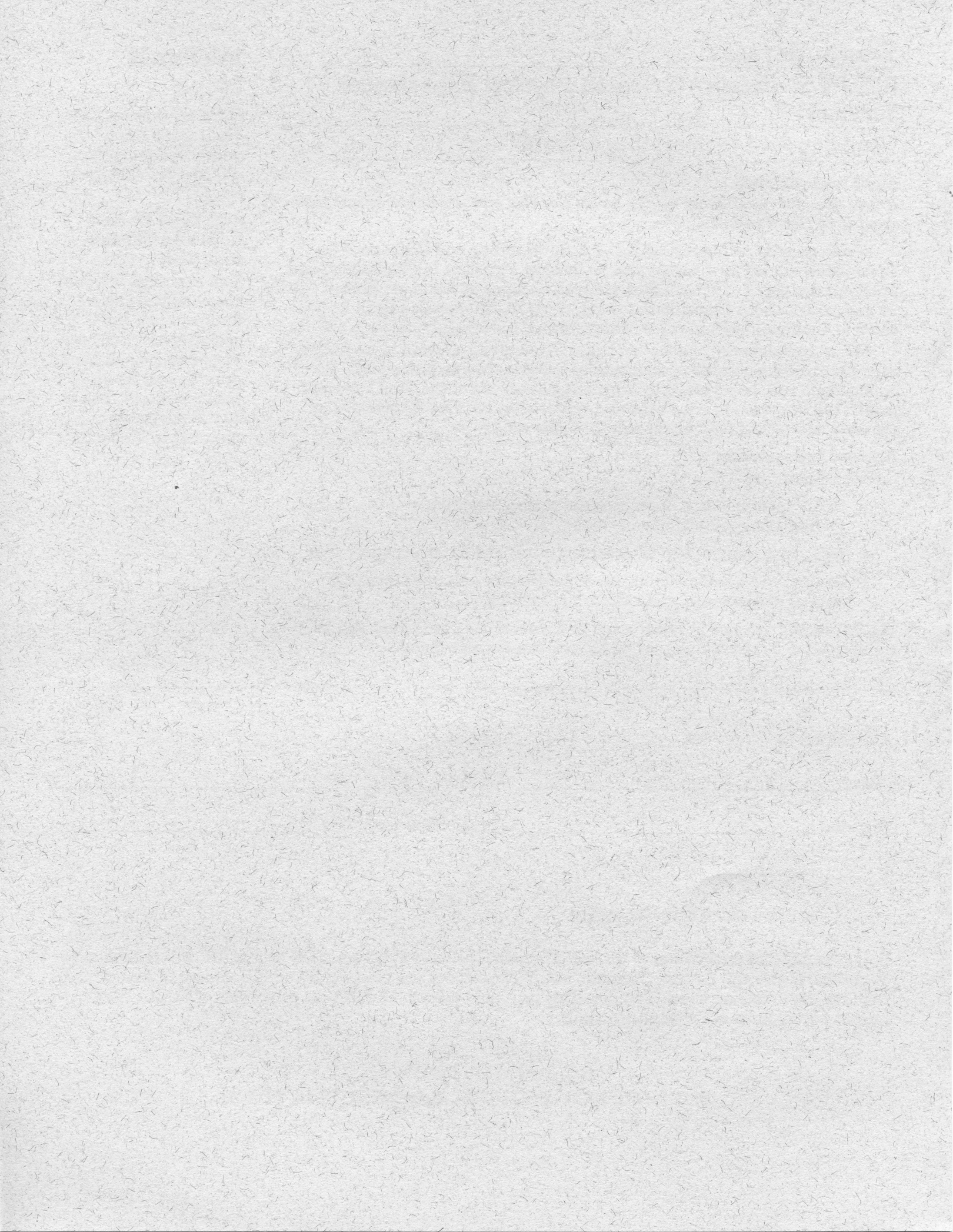

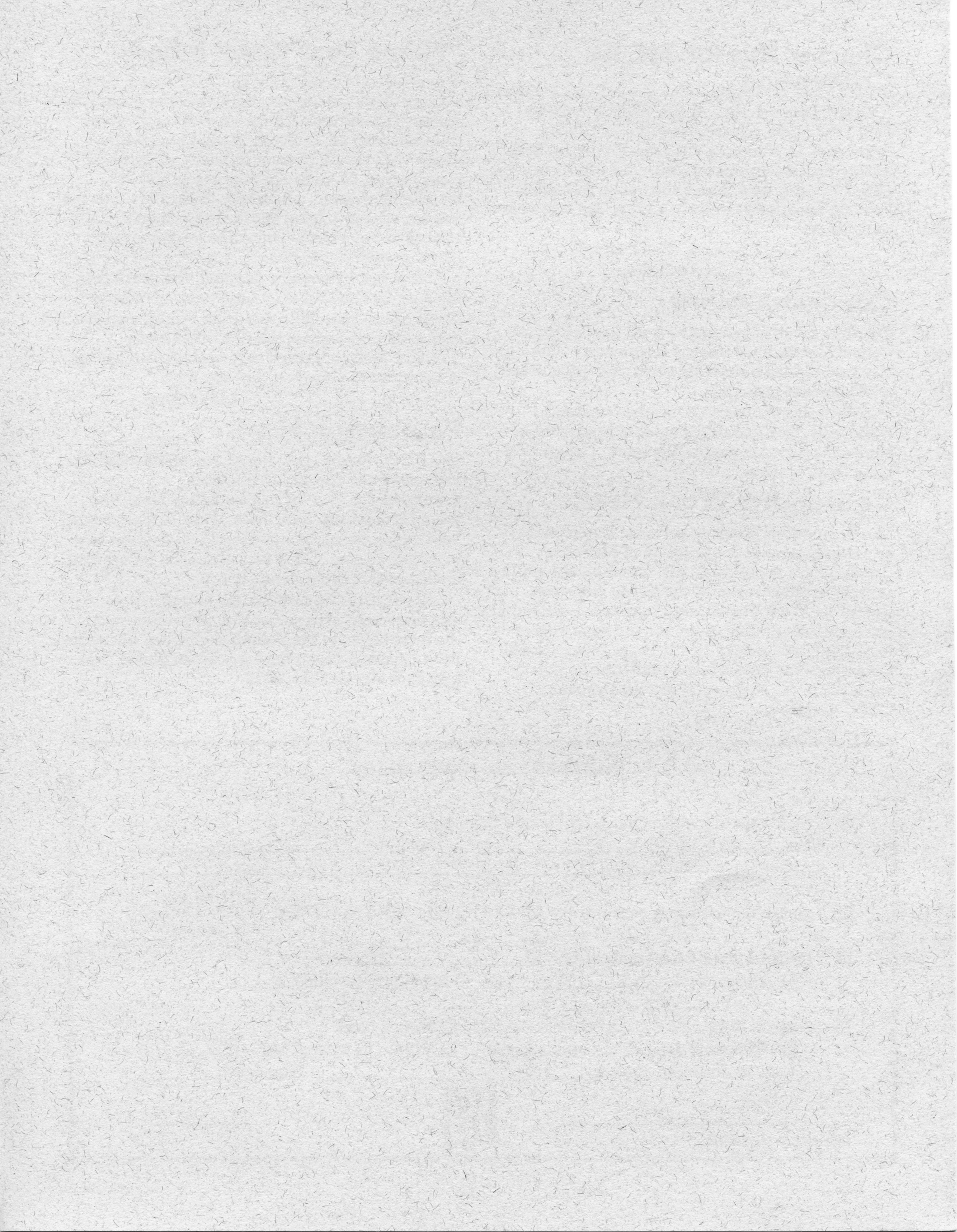

STAFF EVALUATION OF THE REGISTRATION PROCESS

Survey Summary

The first staff survey for evaluating the registration process was conducted in September 1991. A total of 333 surveys were distributed to six divisions: Administrative Services, Enterprise, Institutional Advancement, Instruction, Human Resources and Student Development. A total of 92 surveys were returned, for a response rate of only 28%. Overall, respondents felt the 1991 registration process ran more smoothly than ever before.

Respondents were asked to rate each of the three types of registration: priority, regular, and late, over the last six years. From 1985 to present, the ratings for all types of registration have progressively become more favorable with the '90-'91 registration year receiving the highest average rating: 4.02 on a five point scale (5=excellent; 4=good; 3=average; 2=poor; 1=very poor; 0=no opinion). This was also the year in which Telephone EXpress (TEX) registration was fully implemented. TEX was also evaluated in terms of its impact on respondents' normal workload. A total of 84% of respondents felt TEX either decreased the workload or had no effect. Only 16% indicated it increased their work-load.

Finally, many respondents added comments for some of the questions. Most had a positive reaction to the addition of TEX, the change to alpha registration and the shortening of the registration period. Suggestions for improving registration included the assignment of permanent PIN's, the elimination of Saturday registration and the opinion that advisement should actually advise and not just sign forms.

COMMENTS FROM STAFF EVALUATION OF REGISTRATION PROCESS

September 1991

Question 5: How would you rate each year of registration?

Comments:

- TEX has helped with priority and shortened the lines at regular registration.
- Overall process was much improved.
- Yea! TEX! Will be good to have permanent PINS for students.
- Registration improves every year...our system is better than TWU's.
- TEX has improved registration for students and employees.
- Have heard good things about phone registration.
- TEX has made registration manageable. Alpha registration is a huge improvement over walk-in registration.
- Improving every semester! Good Job!
- Can't remember every year...but the process has definitely improved.
- Still need to find a way for students who do not need advising to get PINS without having to come in.
- More time to work through our paperwork...more evenly distributed.
- There was too much confusion when TEX was piloted to really enjoy...(it), with trained staff, registration runs more smoothly.
- Cleanup with state reports is greatly enhanced.
- New students didn't seem to know they were eligible for TEX.
- Need to have one consistent way of conducting registration.
- For the time period, we have always excelled and progressed.
- Have heard 89-91 were excellent.
- The question is not clear, what are we being asked to comment on?!
- Did not consistently bill students for summer school and dropped them from classes before they were billed. Assistant was defensive and did not want to help solve the problem of a student.
- Some patrons have experienced frustration because the tuition bills were late in arriving. Could be a post office problem but is there anything CCCC can do to ensure early arrival?
- I think we need to stick to deadlines posted in the bulletin, extending deadlines makes it unfair for people who follow the rules.
- TEX has taken a tremendous load off Instruction.
- Getting much better; cutting bullpen registration and adding TEX.
- Registration has steadily improved.
- Smoother, less hectic with onset of TEX, more advisees have been in since TEX.

Question 6: How has Telephone Registration affected your normal workload?

Comments:

- TEX is great.
- Increased during different time of the year & decreased regular registration over previous semesters.
- Staffing issues need analyzed.
- More phone calls due to people asking questions about TEX and the payment process.
- There is a big increase before regular registration and a decrease during regular registration.
- Big increase during TEX and a decrease during regular registration.
- More questions asked, PIN #'s issued, knowledge of TASP & other areas.
- TEX is a great idea!
- Many students expressed their appreciation for the ease of TEX. Have heard no negative comments.
- Constantly busy, however, it has helped with regular registration.
- The amount of daily walk-in traffic has caused an increase in counter traffic and increased the need for data input help.
- Spreading the workload over a longer period of time is much better.
- Less students to advise during registration.
- It's Great!
- Less paperwork to handle-need to upgrade the phone system. Quite a few students had trouble getting through.

- More setups by plant operations.
- More advisors actually come to registration.
- Workload is high prior to TEX.
- Constantly busy, especially in July...difficult to get the workload done because students are constantly coming in.
- Had many more advisees, but system is more efficient and effective.
- Getting phones ready and knocking them down was difficult.
- Created more mailings.
- Increase time giving call numbers and working registration, but it has lightened the load as registration and the beginning of a semester commence.

Question 8: Please give any other specific comments, including suggestions for improvement.

Comments:

- Arrange control for permission only courses.
