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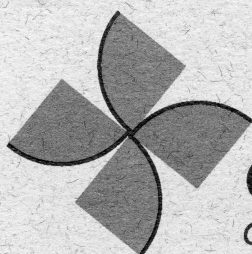

GRADUATE PROGRAMS

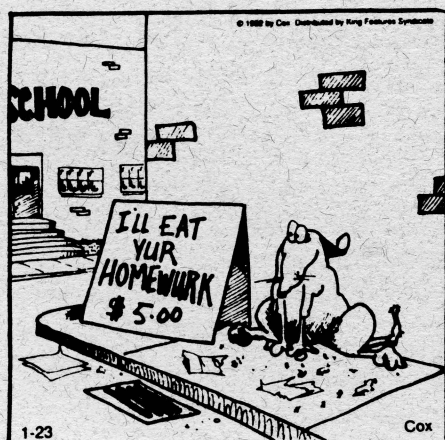
Non-profit Management Certificate Program: University of North Texas

New CPIE Approves Planning Changes

At its first meeting of 1992, the Council on Institutional Effectiveness (CIE) voted to change its title to the Council on Planning and Institutional Effectiveness (CPIE) to reflect its recent absorption of the role and functions of the now defunct Strategic Planning Task Force. CPIE also approved in principle the adoption by the college of a new two-year planning and evaluation cycle to correspond with the biennial state funding cycle. This would mean that major revisions in the strategic plan of the college as a whole and of each individual area would take place every other year, rather than every year. Evaluation of the plan's effectiveness would take place early in the second year of the cycle. More information and guidelines will be distributed as soon as they are available. Summer Humanities Programs

The Division of Education Programs of the National Endowment for the Humanities has established its 1992 Institutes for College and University Faculty.

The 1992 institutes provide several opportunities for full-time teachers at two-year and four-year colleges and universities to conduct intensive studies of texts, historical periods, ideas and issues central to undergraduate teaching in the humanities.

The institutes, sponsored by colleges, universities, libraries, museums and professional organizations usually are scheduled for a period of four to six weeks during the summer.

Among this summer's institutes are:

- Rethinking American Music: New Research and Issues of Cultural Diversity, Boston College.
- American Encounters: New Societies in a New World, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
- Russian History and Culture through Art and Artifact, The Russian Museum and the State Hermitage Museum, St. Petersburg, Russia.

Participants receive \$250 stipends per week and an allowance toward the cost of room, travel and board. Interested applicants should contact the institutes directly for further information.
