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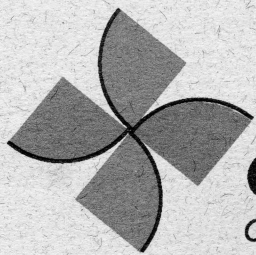


Susan Farrar, director of Academic Computing Services, has a talent not many people know about. She is into swing and country and western dancing and has won several awards recently in dance competitions.

Rodeo Stampedes Into Town

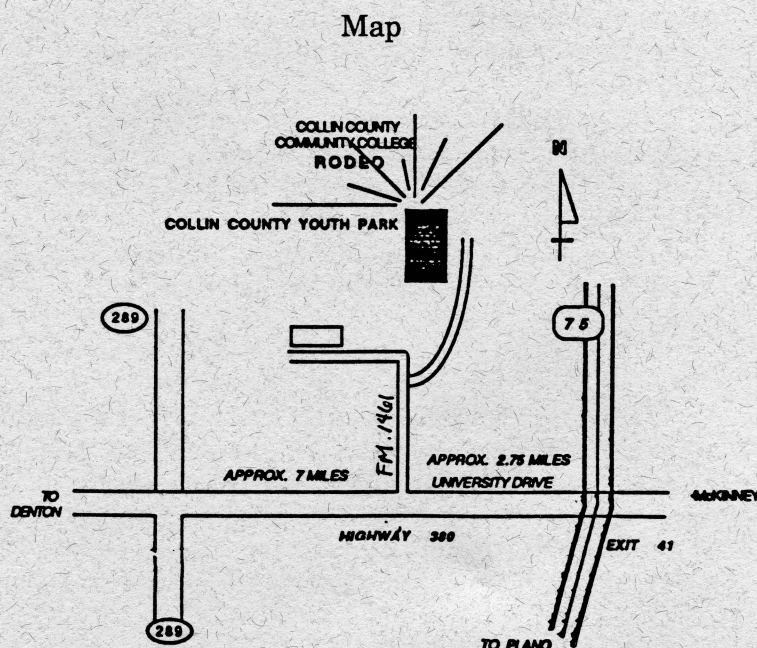
CCCC's Fourth Annual Rodeo will kick up dust on Friday and Saturday, April 24-25 at the Collin County Youth Park west of McKinney.

Xerox to Give Demonstration on Reading Tutor

Xerox will be giving a demonstration of its new Reading Tutor Tuesday, April 21 in the Spring Creek Campus Learning Resources Center.

The Reading Tutor is ideal for learning disabled students because it can scan a book and read it back to a student. The equipment has hundreds of capabilities, including reading material back in a man's, woman's or child's voice; an 800,000-word dictionary; hook-up to IBM or Apple computers; and tutorials which can audibly define, spell and pronounce words.

Xerox also is working on networking possibilities that will allow several computers to work from the same book and allow the book to be saved on disk and retrieved on another computer.

Marj Ramsey, a learning disabilities specialist at CCCC, says the equipment is amazing to watch and recommends that all faculty members who require student reading see the demonstration.

Other learning disabilities counselors from area schools will be on hand for the Xerox demonstrations, which are set for 10 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. in the LRC conference room.

CCCC Student Wins \$5,000 Art Grant

Gloria Ross, a printmaking student at CCCC, has received a \$5,000 fellowship award from the Mid America Art Alliance/National Endowment of the Arts Fellowship Program in Paintings and Works on Paper.

Ross, a resident of Plano, submitted 10 slides of recent artwork and was selected to receive a grant. Her work was reviewed by a five-member panel of nationally recognized artists, and Ross was one of 20 award recipients out of the 797 applications received.

Ross received her master of fine arts degree from North Texas State University and has participated in several solo and invitational exhibitions, as well as juried and group exhibitions, both regionally and nationally.

The award may be used at the artist's discretion. Ross said she may use the money to travel to workshops or to purchase computer or silkscreening equipment for her visual arts projects. In addition to the monetary award, Ross has the opportunity to show her work regionally and nationally through Exposure, a subsidized exhibition program available to museums, galleries and community centers.

WIT AND WISDOM

People who stand still may avoid stubbing their toes, but they won't make much progress. Every company, every department needs supervisors with the courage to try new ideas and run the risk of making mistakes. Otherwise progress never happens.

"The better a man is, the more mistakes he will make, for the more new things he will try," says management consultant Peter Druker. "I would never promote into a top-level job a man who was not making mistakes...otherwise he is sure to be mediocre."

None of us likes to make a mistake. All managers worth their salt want to avoid errors. But who can tell for sure whether a new idea will work until it has actually been tried? If the possible gains far outweigh the potential loss, it's a mistake not to try it.

Successful managers don't have enough fingers to count all the mistakes they've made. That's one reason they are successful—because they possess the spark and courage to take action where others hesitate. When they do commit an error, they don't chalk it up as a complete loss—they try to learn something from it that will sharpen their judgment the next time around. Mistakes are painful, but also instructive.

Good managers are cautious, but not too cautious. If they show an excessive fear of mistakes, the initiative of their associates can be stifled. People get supercautious if every little slip-up tends to unnerve their managers.

For instance, when one of your people makes a mistake:

Do you keep your head? Do you calmly assess the situation and decide what corrective action to take?

Do you place the emphasis, not on the mistake, but on seeing that your people don't get burned twice the same way?

It's great to strive for failure-proof performance, but not at the expense of progress. Have the courage to try new ideas and don't discourage initiative by being overly critical of reasonable efforts that "didn't work."

Do you curb the natural tendency to look for a scapegoat?

Do you avoid covering up the mistake? The wiser course is simply to inform everyone affected and correct the error promptly.

Occasional failure is the price of improvement.
