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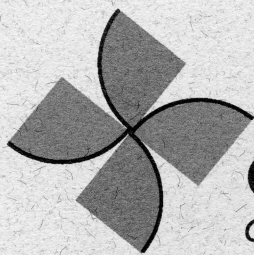

From the Registrar's Office

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974, often referred to as the Buckley Amendment, governs the release of student information.

This federal legislation is designed to protect the privacy of a student's education records, and defines an education record as any document or file that is directly related to the student maintained by the educational institution. Therefore, records may include paper and microfilmed documents, as well as information maintained on personal or main-frame computers.

Only that information classified as "directory" may be released without **prior written consent** of the student. In compliance with FERPA recommendations, CCCC has defined directory information as: student name; address; phone number; date and

place of birth; major field of study; participation in officially recognized activities and sports; weight and height of athletic team members; dates of attendance; most recent previous educational institution attended; and degrees and awards received.

However, students may request that directory information be restricted. This request must be made annually and is noted on the Student Information System of CCCC's mainframe software. If directory information is restricted, **no** information may be released without the student's prior written consent.

The Registrar's Office will be presenting a session in August during staff development day for those interested in learning more about the privacy of student records.

CCCC Opens Electronic Library of the Future

There is a small room in the CCCC Learning Resources Center where a handful of computers contain thousands of volumes of information, all on compact discs.

The LRC has a "virtual library" of information stored in its new electronic library of the future on both campuses.

With seven terminals at Spring Creek Campus and two terminals at Central Park Campus, the microwave networked system is one of only a few of its kind in the country. It has an extensive 32-database library—with everything from a 21-volume encyclopedia set to the text of 107 history books—all on compact discs.

The college-funded CD-ROM Library of the Future is a quick and easy way for multiple users to retrieve instant text, photos, video, audio and photograph-like images off the computer. The CD-ROM discs also have integrated motion, sound and color and black and white illustrations to accompany texts.

For example, one almanac on Birds of America has 500 color bird lithographs and CD audio bird calls for most species.

Libraries all over the country are in various stages of implementing this kind of technology, with a variety of databases and available terminals. For more information on the new electronic library, call the LRC at ext. 5860.

CCCC to Host Groundbreaking Ceremonies at CPC

CCCC will celebrate the beginning of construction on an addition to Central Park Campus in McKinney with groundbreaking ceremonies at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 19.

Faculty and staff are invited to attend the ceremonies. CCCC Board of Trustees Chairman Carey Cox and CCCC President John Anthony will speak during the ceremonies. Members of the McKinney City Council and other city officials will also be in attendance.

Refreshments will be available after the brief ceremony in the first floor atrium of the college.

Construction on the \$4.54 million addition began in April and is expected to be completed by the fall 1993 semester. The new wing will provide 72,000 square feet of additional space for classrooms, faculty and staff offices, an auditorium/theater, physical education facilities, a food service area and a high-tech classroom.

Bryan Garrett of Rockwall; and Walter Hannah of Farmers Branch, Brookhaven College Police Department.

The academy began on March 2, 1992, and the students have completed more than 400 hours of training in Texas Criminal Law, traffic laws, patrol procedures, self defense, firearms, physical fitness and much more.

Instructors for the academy included licensed police instructors from the Collin County Sheriff's Office; Denton County Sheriff's Office; Farmers Branch Police Department; Plano Police Department; Dallas Police Department; State of Texas Alcohol and Beverage Commission; McKinney Police Department; CCCC Police Department; American Red Cross; and the Collin County District Attorney's Office.

Ron Spears, director of the academy, presented the rookies, and Sgt. Tim Quintana and Assistant Academy Director J.C. Clark of the Collin County Sheriff's Office presented the certificates.

CCCC received academy status in June 1990 from the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education. The college has been working with the Collin County Sheriff's Office since 1985 providing training programs for law enforcement officers. The academy is rapidly becoming a vital support service for area law enforcement agencies.

CCCC Police Department to Establish Bicycle Patrol

The CCCC Law Enforcement Academy/Police Department soon will begin bicycle patrols of Spring Creek Campus and Central Park Campus.

Ron Spears, director of the Law Enforcement academies, said two Raleigh Mountain bicycles have been purchased by the college for the patrols.

"Many cities, colleges and universities around the nation have introduced such programs within their jurisdictions and have found them highly effective," he said. "The bikes will help police officers move quickly and easily, let them access parts of the campus that aren't easily accessible by car and also help police have more positive contact with the students and the campus community."

The bikes will help the campus police department supplement its security and police services at both campuses, but primarily at SCC. The patrols will be provided by commissioned police officers for the college and police cadets in training.

Using bike patrols, Spears said, is a more economical means of providing police services to CCCC than using patrol cars. The cost of completely outfitting 25 officers for bicycle patrol, including the cost of the bikes, is about the same as purchasing one patrol car.
