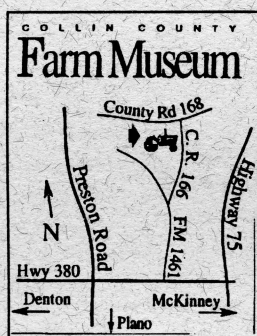
## Collin County Farm Museum Events

## From the Registrar's Office

### (Last in the series of FERPA articles)

Summary of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (The Buckle Amendment)

- FERPA protects personally identifiable student information including that which is easily traceable
- Institutions may release educational records only with the student's prior written permission
- Institutions may release directory information without the student's consent (see the catalog for definition of directory information)
- Students may restrict the release of directory information
- Institutions may release educational records based on exceptions found in the law, including release to school officials with a legitimate educational interest

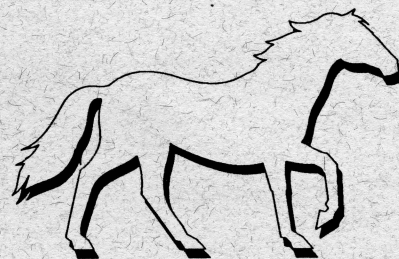
