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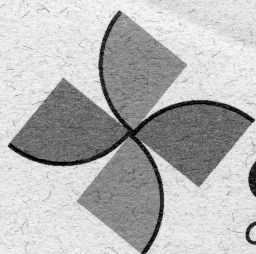

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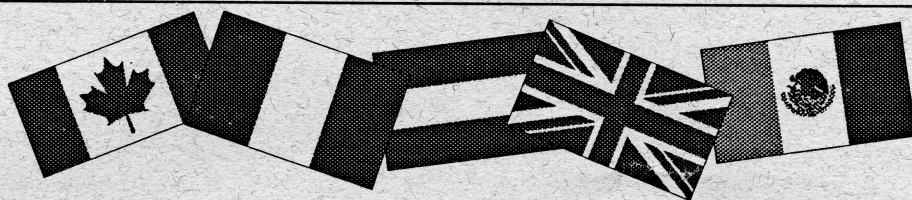
"Hands..." Author Visits this Week

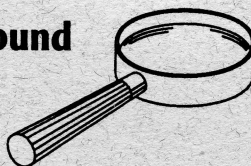

Counseling Corner

AIDS & Safe Sex

An instructional videotape in the LRC shows a physician informing CCCC students that some of them and our faculty will contract AIDS. The physician states that this is a reality we will all have to come to grips with. There is very little truly safe sex, and college students tend to be a particularly sexually active group. On any given Saturday night, a number of our students could contract the AIDS virus.

The college's Counseling Department has prepared a hard-hitting, experiential classroom presentation on this important subject. I am available to give this presentation to any class upon invitation by a faculty member. I will tailor the material to the subject matter of the particular class.

The only known antidote to AIDS is education. We have all seen our share of AIDS information programs, and these programs are essential. However, information about AIDS has not succeeded in changing people's behavior enough to prevent the transmission of the AIDS virus. Therefore, the Counseling Department's presentation is primarily experiential and only secondarily informational. It is designed to help students clarify their own views on AIDS & Safe Sex, and therefore, to make better decisions about their own behavior.
