
The Employee Recognition Program recognizes and rewards CCCC staff members for their contributions to the college's success. Nominees and winners will be

CCCC is participating in "Mathematics Awareness Week" April 25-May 1. The Math Lab within the Mathematics and Natural Science Division will host a one-hour program celebrating Mathematics Awareness Week from 3:15-4:15 p.m., Friday, April 30. The session will be in J228/SCC, better known as the "Math Lab."

During the program, outstanding mathematics students will be honored. These students are selected by their professors because of their dedication and hard work as well as their outstanding ability in mathematics. There will also be a very special guest.

Dr. Pauline T. Johnson, a registered nurse and associate professor of nursing at Baylor University, will speak on "Preparation for Tomorrow." Johnson has been a nurse educator for 17 years. She received her Ph.D. in nursing from Texas Woman's University in 1986. She has taught nursing administration at the graduate level for 12 years, specializing in the area of power in the organization. Johnson has presented her research on organization many times and is a distinguished lecturer for Sigma Theta Tau International,

the honor society for nurses.

The theme for Math Awareness Week 1993 is "Mathematics and Manufacturing," appropriately named to emphasize the importance of bringing mathematics to a wider audience. In this critical time of education reform, we need to expose the general public to the everyday uses of math in technology and industry. The need for mathematics education during the early stages of public and private education in America must gain new momentum so our children and young people will be the leaders in the industries of tomorrow.

CCCC is continuing to help bring mathematics into the public's eye with two particular efforts. "Mathematics" is being used in the title of one of the new divisions at CCCC, and the Cooperative Education program at CCCC is currently enlisting students of mathematics in its Cooperative Work Experience courses. Students enrolled in CWE apply practical work experience to classroom knowledge and theory, and gain a fuller understanding of how mathematics can be used in a career field.
