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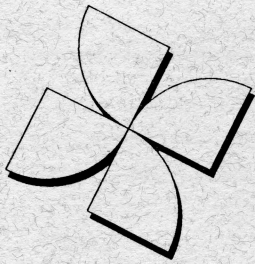

Batter Up

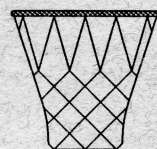
Local baseball players can improve both their offensive and defensive skills during

one of CCCC's 1-week baseball clinics. The Express Baseball Clinics are July 5-9 and July 12-16 for 8-11

year olds and July 19-23 for 12-16 year olds. Each session, which is limited to 100 players, begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 3:30 p.m. everyday.

The clinics will be conducted at Sewell Field/SCC, and the cost is \$100. A pitching-only clinic is available to 12-16 year olds for \$55. Lunches, catered by area restaurants, and videotaped instruction are available for additional charges.

The Express Basketball Camp, which caters to boys and girls ages 8-18, is scheduled for June 14-18. CCCC's men's basketball coach Jim

Sigona and his camp staff of CCCC players, area high school coaches and local college coaches are dedicated to

meeting the needs of these young, developing players.

The camp will be held in the Gym/SCC from 9:45 a.m.-4 p.m., Monday through Friday. The cost is \$125, which includes videotaped shooting analysis, T-shirt, written evaluation, and individual and team awards. Registration is at 8:30 a.m., Monday, June 14.

Sigona and his coaching staff also are offering three Saturday morning basketball clinics for 8-16 year old players. These morning clinics are June 12, 19 and 26 from 9 a.m.-noon. Clinic participants will learn skills such as shooting, ball handling, passing and defense through individual instruction and attention. Registration is each Saturday at 8:30 a.m., and the cost is \$20 per session.

CWE Banquet Honors Students, Employers

Dr. Barbara Eubanks and Dr. Steve Ellis presented the Cooperative Work Experience's Student of the Year Award and a \$400 scholarship to Mary Ardis, advertising art major, at the Employer Appreciation Banquet on Friday, May 7.

Ardis worked for the V.I.P. Program in the risk management department of Plano. Her supervisor, Barbara Wood, recommended her for the award because Ardis went above and beyond the call of duty in her position. She designed the layout for the program's safety manual, and this project helped her land her first job as a production artist for the *Park Cities People* and the *Northside People* newspapers. In summing up her experience with CWE, Ardis said, "It has taught me one major thing that I could never get in a classroom—self-confidence. Co-op has changed my life!"

Facts About Disabilities

People with hearing impairments: 22 million including 2 million who are deaf

People who are totally blind: 120,000

People with epilepsy: 2 million (note: four out of five people with epilepsy do not have seizures because they take medication)

People who are partially or completely paralyzed: 1.2 million

People who use wheelchairs: 1 million

People with developmental disabilities such as cerebral palsy and mental retardation: between 2 and 2.5 million people. Nine of 10 people with mental retardation have mild mental retardation.

People with speech impairments: 2.1 million

According to the Americans with Disabilities Act, there are 43 million Americans with disabilities. The above statistics were published by the National Center for Medical Rehabilitation Research in "The Scope of Physical Disability in America—Populations Served."
