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

Registration Update

At the close of the spring semester, CCCC began offering students the option of receiving their grades by calling TEX, the college's Telephone EXpress system previously used primarily for registration. Enrolled students could use this option and also receive a written grade report. Effective with the summer term, grade reports will be mailed to students on request-only basis, by calling the Registrar's Office at either campus.

In an attempt to offer state-of-the-art services such as TEX, we hope to reduce reliance on previous methods of communication which may be redundant. If successful, CCCC will realize savings on forms and postage—money that can be better utilized to enhance the Telephone EXpress system and other voice mail services. Professors will be receiving classroom announcements regarding this change in service; students have been notified via the *Fall 1993 Schedule of Classes* and the student newsletter, *Update*. Dates that TEX grades become available are listed on page 4.

Sometimes students need their grades before official transcripts are ready to be processed. The Registrar's Office has written procedures on how students may obtain early grades for graduation, admissions or other purposes. These procedures appeared on the reverse of the memo to faculty that accompanied summer grade rosters. For more information contact the Registrar's Office at ext. 5741 or 6741.



En Garde! Shakespeare Comes to JAT



Facts About Diabetes

Diabetes kills about 150,000 people each year. Although many have heard of the disease, few understand the types and how they develop.

Diabetes develops as either Type I or Type II. Type I diabetes usually occurs in children, who suffer from an inability of the pancreas to secrete insulin. Insulin acts to clear sugars (glucose) from the blood so that abnormal levels do not build up. Type I diabetics take insulin daily to combat this problem, however, it is not a cure.

Type II diabetics are usually over the age of 40 and overweight. In this case, insulin is secreted but it fails to be effective at clearing the sugars. Mexican-Americans suffer from this type of diabetes at a 300 percent higher rate than other populations. Type II diabetics also may be required to take insulin daily to combat this disease. In most cases, however, Type II diabetes can be corrected through a special diet, a weight-loss program and a regular exercise program.

Warning signs of diabetes are frequent urination, fatigue, extreme hunger, nausea, blurred vision, drowsiness and tingling of the extremities, and these signs should be discussed with a physician.

Of course many patrons will come to watch Shakespeare's tender love story, but many more will come expecting to see some exciting swordplay," says Baker. "Janet's fight direction is challenging, both for the actors and audience, and in many instances the duels are spectacular."

While many theatre-goers in the Metroplex have come to associate summer with Shakespeare, the open-air presentations in Dallas are no longer the only Shakespearean shows in town. Indeed, "Romeo and Juliet" is the first play in what promises to be an annual summer Shakespeare festival scheduled to take place at CCCC.

"Romeo and Juliet" is directed by Mr. Jamie Lawrence, and plays 12 performances between July 21 and Aug. 1 in the John Anthony Theatre. Performance times are: July 21-24 and July 28-31 at 8 p.m., with matinees on July 24-25, 31 and August 1 at 2:15 p.m.

Tickets are priced at \$6 for general admission and \$4 for students, CCCC faculty/staff, and senior citizens (age 55+). For tickets contact the Quad C theatre box office at ext. 5809. A TDD information line for hearing impaired patrons is available at ext. 5950. Special note: performances on Sunday July 25 (2:15 p.m.) and Friday July 30 (8 p.m.) will be sign-interpreted for the hearing impaired. The John Anthony Theatre is fully accessible to patrons with disabilities.
