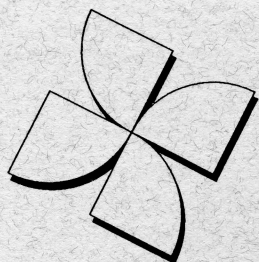

Another Great Season Is Just Around the Corner

The 1993-94 theatre season at Collin County Community College promises to be just like last year's season—fun, innovative, diverse and enjoyable for everyone. And with award-winning authors such as Mark Medoff and Ted Tally providing the scripts, there's no doubt this season will be a hit.

The season opens with the Pulitzer Prize-winning play "Driving Miss Daisy." Set in mid-century Atlanta, this delicate depiction of racial tensions tells the story of an elderly Jewish matron, Daisy Werthan, and her chauffeur, Hoke Coleburn. Spanning 25 years of their relationship, Alfred Uhry has created two outsiders who come to mutual respect based on their independence, strength and stubborn integrity. "Driving Miss Daisy" runs from Thursday, Sept. 9 to Sunday, Sept. 19 with both evening and matinee performances.

October brings a different kind of drama to the John Anthony Theatre as the Quad C Theatre program presents the acclaimed play "Terra Nova." This play is based on the 1911-12 race to the South Pole between five Englishmen and five Norwegians. An intense action-drama, "Terra Nova" touchingly dramatized the final journey of explorer Robert Falcon Scott. This play is written by Ted Tally, the Academy Award-winning author of "Silence of the Lambs." Performance dates for "Terra Nova" are Thursday, Oct. 14 to Sunday, Oct. 24.

Rounding out the fall semester is CCCC's Christmas production of the classic family comedy "The Man Who Came to Dinner." Written by George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart, this play depicts the nightmare each of us has had about being stuck with an unwanted houseguest just in time for the arrival of relatives for the Christmas holidays. "The Man Who Came to Dinner" runs Thursday, Dec. 9 to Sunday, Dec. 19.

After the success of last season's drama "The Hands of Its Enemy," 1994 will once again bring internationally-acclaimed playwright Mark Medoff to CCCC. In March the Quad C Theatre program presents the area premier of Medoff's newest play "Stefanie Hero." This play is an exciting family tale of good versus evil and self-reliance and is a must for families to see. Medoff will visit CCCC to work on the production and will present a lecture/discussion in conjunction with the play's opening. "Stefanie Hero" runs Thursday, March 3 to Sunday, March 13.

The 1993-94 theatre season concludes in May with the critically-acclaimed musical comedy "Baby." Nominated for five Tony Awards while on Broadway, "Baby" is the delightful look at three couples and their sometimes tentative steps toward parenthood. Performance dates for "Baby" are Thursday, April 28 to Sunday, May 8.

Tickets to these shows are available through the Quad C Theatre Box Office. A subscription for the 1993-94 season is \$26 for adults and \$18 for students, children and senior citizens. Season subscription holders also receive free admission to the American College Theatre Festival in October at CCCC, which will showcase outstanding college theatre from Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana. CCCC Posts Low Workers' Comp Claims

CCCC was recently honored as a platinum award winner for its low number of workers' compensation claims during the 1991-92 year by Hibbs-Hallmark & Company. The college participates in a 20-member community college association that purchases workers' compensation insurance through Hibbs-Hallmark.

This partially-self-funded insurance program, which was designed by Hibbs-Hallmark, places the responsibility of safety with the individual community college. Hibbs-Hallmark has a team of loss control engineers who assist with compliance with a set

of strict safety standards, and the saving generated from these reduced losses remain with the college. CCCC used less than 25 percent of the funds set aside to pay claims last year, resulting in a savings to the college of \$17,388.

The March Is on to Courtyard Center

With the opening of the Courtyard Center for Professional and Economic Development this month, the responsibilities of several CCCC staff members are being revised or expanded.

Jack Gray, vice president for college and community development, will serve as building administrator for the Courtyard Center and also has been assigned the task of establishing a formal economic development program for CCCC by Dr. John Anthony.

Paula Roman, director of Development, will assume additional duties as executive director of the CCCC Foundation, Inc. During the period of transition, the fundraising program directed by Roman will report directly to Dr. Anthony.

Shari Swift, who has been serving as development associate, will be relocating to Courtyard Center as administrative assistant to

the vice president for C & CD, Jack Gray. Also joining the Courtyard staff will be Roberta Kess as the coordinator of business and community relations. In her new role, Kess will market the college to many constituencies, especially the corporate community, with emphasis on CCCC's credit and non-credit corporate training capabilities.

Dede Day, executive secretary to the vice president for college and community development, also is assuming new duties as grants administration associate in the Development Office.

Dea Norton is moving to the President's Office to assume her new responsibilities as secretary.

"These changes in our organization will enable the college to move in new directions, and we are excited at the potential that exists," Dr. Anthony said.

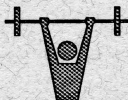

An unprecedented county-wide assessment of human services needs in Collin County is being conducted by the "We CAN Committee." This committee is made up of approximately 59 volunteers from across Collin County with administrative support provided by Collin County United Way. The project is comprised of three surveys. The Key Informant Survey will be mailed July 30 to approximately 500 community leaders and human service providers in Collin County. Client Surveys will be sent to human service agencies
