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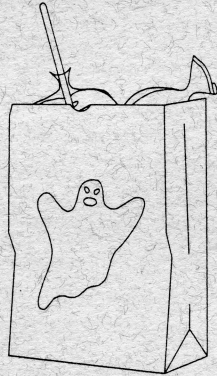

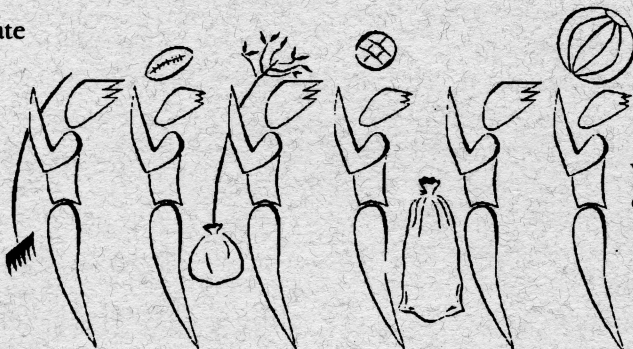
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## Team/Volunteer Day Update

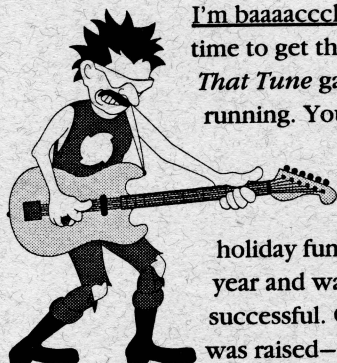

## T R U T H S

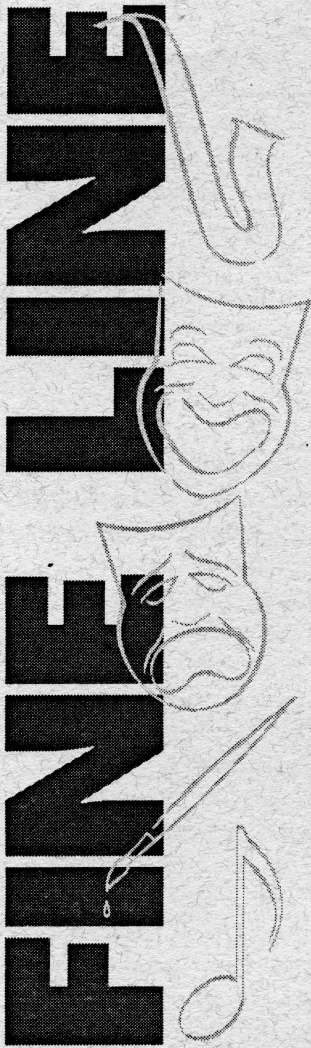
Here is another of Dr. Anthony's “truths.” By remembering and applying these truths to our daily tasks, we as individuals, and as a college, can continue to make a difference in the lives of our students, staff and faculty.

“The fourth truth: no one will learn unless they believe they can learn. A large part of teaching has to do with helping students come to believe they can learn. This is best accomplished through a process of building self-esteem by way of positive reinforcement. I know of no one who has ever been improved through negative reinforcement. When students generally believe they can learn, the teacher need only create learning opportunities. As Heidigger said: “To be a teacher is above all to let others learn.”

## Principle-Centered Leadership Teleconference

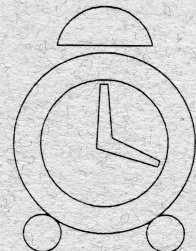
