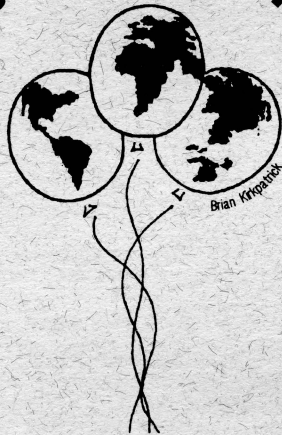

A Reminder from the Business Office

As communicated in a memo to administrative staff dated Dec. 20, 1993 from the Business Office, college funds cannot be used for nonbusiness/personal items such as gifts, flowers and greeting cards. This would also include the printing of notices and invitations for showers, birthdays and other personal gatherings. Attendance of and preparation for these types of events should be on personal time and recorded as such on timesheets. These events are not prohibited, however, we must ensure that college time and resources are used appropriately in compliance with state law.

Additional items listed in the business office memo as examples of inappropriate uses of college funds were gifts to individuals, associations or corporations, charitable or political contributions, and birthday cakes. Questions about appropriate use of college funds should be addressed to Ralph Hall at ext. 6631. Questions related to timesheets and work hours should be addressed to Human Resources at ext. 6663.

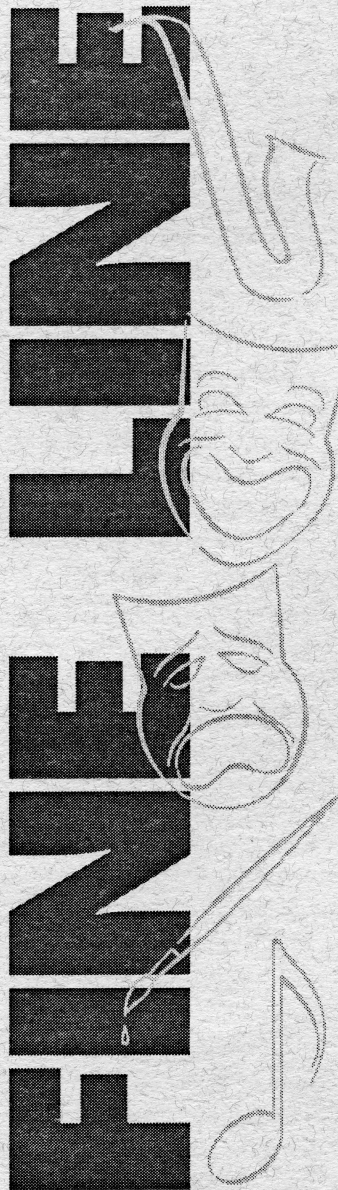

The CCCC Jazz Lab Band, under the direction of Kris Berg, and Expressions, under the direction of Michael Crawford, traveled to New Orleans on Saturday, March 19 to participate in the 25th Annual Loyola University Jazz Ensemble Festival. This is one of the largest jazz festivals in the South with groups participating from Alabama, Florida, Indiana, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas.

The band received a trophy for superior performance, and they were the only community college group to receive a Superior Performance citation. Saxophonist Kevin McNerney and pianist Angela Gardner also received Outstanding Soloist awards. The band performed "Bebop & Roses" from Woody Herman's band, "Brown Boy" arranged by Berg, and "Sophisticated Lady" and "That's All," which featured vocalist Michelle Staley. CCCC's own Washington James, who plays trumpet, is part of this award-winning group. Expressions was the only vocal ensemble out of 36 groups at the jazz festival. The group received an Outstanding Performance citation for their work.

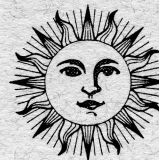
"Baby" Is Just Around the Corner

February 18 "Text and Image" Workshop Update

80 faculty members and administrators from 16 member institutions and Trinity High School (Hurst-Euless-Bedford) attended this outstanding presentation, co-sponsored by the Community College Humanities Association and the North Texas Community and Junior College Consortium. Presenters **Karmien Bowman** (Art) and **Mike Matthews** (English) of TCJC's Northeast Campus demonstrated their innovative interdisciplinary teaching approach whereby writing students write texts in response to images and art students create images in response to texts. The workshop will probably be held in July, and will be conducted by UNT faculty or

administrators. The current subcommittee plus **Claire Gauntlett** of Cedar Valley and **Virginia Wheelless** and **Kandace Salomone Gandel** of North Texas will present a workshop outline at our next meeting.

After discussing the current surveys that the subcommittee has collected and reviewed and some pros and cons of common surveys or a core of common questions, we asked subcommittee members to draft and present at our next meeting a statement of the proposed purpose, goals, and desired results of such collaborative student survey efforts.

◆Listed our current activities and priorities for the near future to forward to the Steering Committee for review and inclusion in overall Consortium plans.

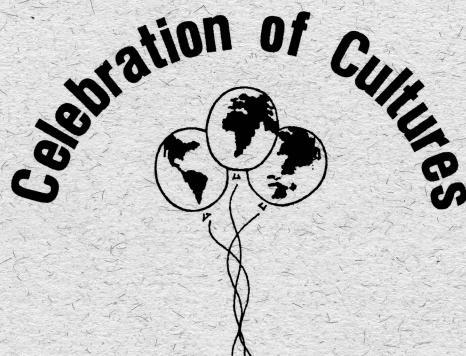
