Soon trustees and staff will consider names for the buildings. (And we were all getting attached to those most-descriptive letters!)

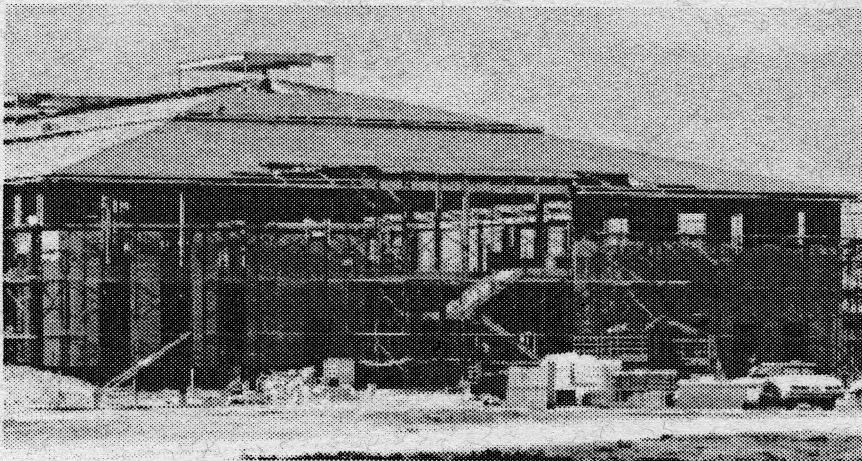

Records Management Series

(This is the fourth in a series of articles on the college's records management program.)

In many cases, it is not practical to keep records in an office for the entire retention period. Inactive records may be placed in storage, either on-campus or at a commercial storage facility. Uniform boxes should be used for storing inactive records. The recommended boxes are "letter/legal" boxes that are 15" x 12" x 10", and may be purchased at the Bookstore at either campus. The boxes should have lids and handles. Letter size records fit front to back, legal size records fit side to side, and computer forms fit stacked in the boxes. When filled, these boxes usually weigh approximately 35 pounds (no more than 50) and are easily lifted by most office workers. This is within the requirements stated in the Occupational Safety Hazards Act (OSHA).

Do not store more than one type of record in the same box. Before sending to storage, the boxes must be clearly labeled with the following information:

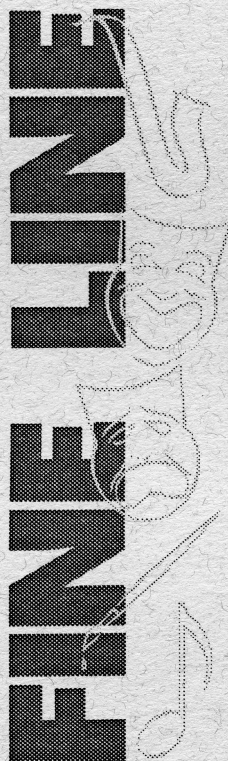

Fall Jazz Concert

The Music Department will showcase its award-winning jazz ensembles in the third annual "Fall Jazz Concert," at 8 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 12 in the John Anthony Theatre.

The event will feature the CCCC "Jazz Lab Band" under the direction of Kris Berg, Director of Jazz Studies, and the "Expressions" vocal jazz ensemble, conducted by Michael Crawford, Dean of Fine Arts.

The Jazz Lab Band will perform "Kensal Rise," an arrangement previously recorded by the University of North Texas 1 O'Clock Lab Band, and will feature the vocal talents of Michele Staley on "It Had To Be You."

While under Berg's direction, the ensemble has gained recognition as one of

the best community college big bands in the area and was named outstanding jazz band at both the Oklahoma State University Jazz Festival (1993) and the Loyola Jazz Festival (1994). The band will travel to the Wichita State University Jazz Festival in spring 1995.

"Expressions," a 12-voice jazz ensemble, will present a wide range of choral arrangements, including the swinging "Blue Skies" and a Phil Mattson arrangement of "Stella By Starlight." Tenor Terry Chapman will premier his arrangement of the "Music Man" favorite "Till There Was You." The much-traveled vocal ensemble has performed locally, nationally and internationally during the past seven years, including a concert at the prestigious Montreux Jazz Festival in Montreux, Switzerland in 1990. Travel plans for the spring include a performance at Disney World for the "Collegiate Choral Festival."

A highlight of the concert will be a combined performance of "All the Things You Are" arranged by Berg for jazz band and vocal jazz ensemble.

Cost of the concert is \$5. Tickets are available from any band or choral member and a limited number of tickets will be available at the door. Call ext. 5107 for more information.

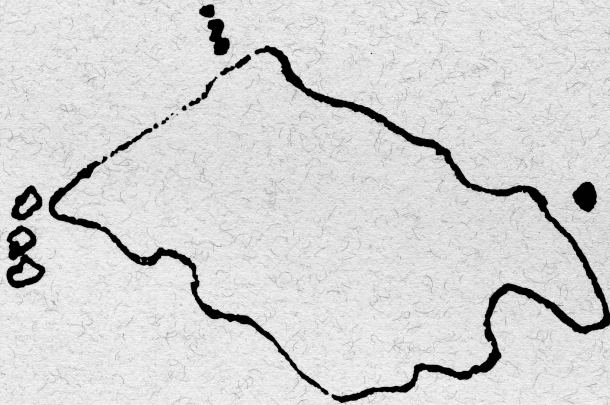

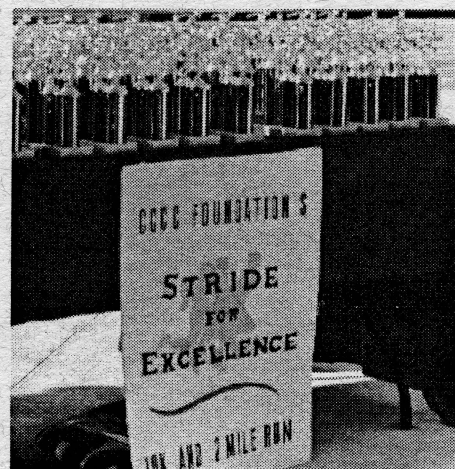
Some faculty/staff did more than volunteer. Among those running in the event were Steve Ellis, Martha Ellis, Belinda Newman and Mary McRae.

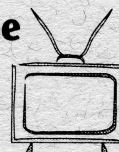

Quad C Theatre Wins Big at American College Theatre Festival

The Quad C Theatre received 16 awards at the Northeast Texas State competition of the American College Theatre Festival, held at SCC in late October. Nearly 1,900 patrons attended the competition.

The festival is a national theatre competition which adjudicates more than 800 productions annually. The winners at each of seven regional festivals will advance to the national festival, held in Washington D.C. There each school shows their production at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Quad C's production of "Execution of Justice" was one of the big winners at the festival, receiving five awards. Craig "Yo" Erickson won for outstanding lighting; Brendan Quigley was cited for outstanding technical direction; Christopher Wilems won outstanding stage manager and Kevin O'Brien and Edwin O'Neill were recognized for excellence in acting.

The student written play, "Beep...BANG!" also received multiple awards, including outstanding student production. Robin Armstrong won for outstanding student direction; Michael Wright, professor of drama at the University of Texas-El Paso and the ACTF

Playwrighting Chairman, noted during the awards presentation that "Beep...BANG!" was one of the best student written plays he has seen in his tenure in ACTF. The play will be recommended to advance to the ACTF Regional Finals, held in February in Fayetteville, Ark.

Eight CCCC actors have received Irene Ryan nominations, advancing to the regional level of the national acting competition in Fayetteville. The award is considered the highest award a collegiate performer can receive.
