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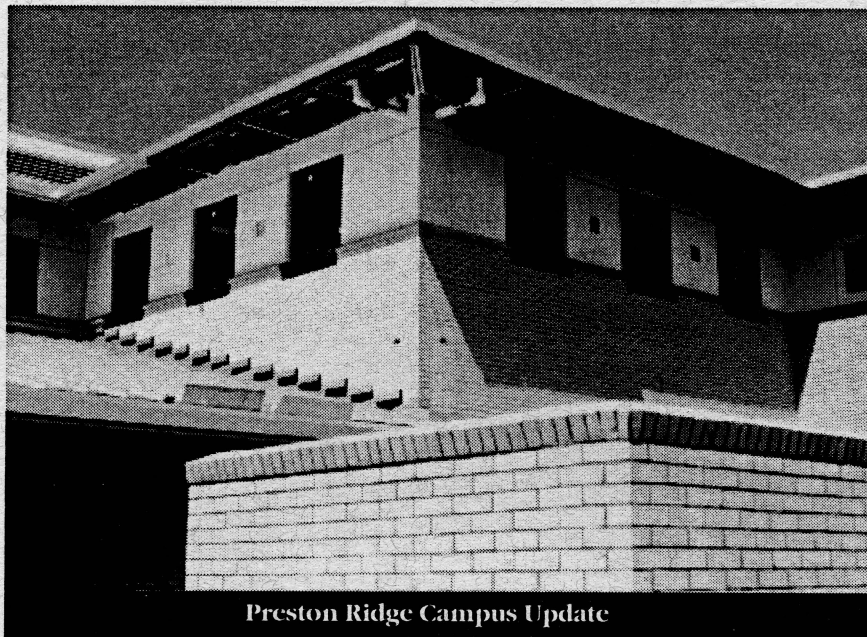

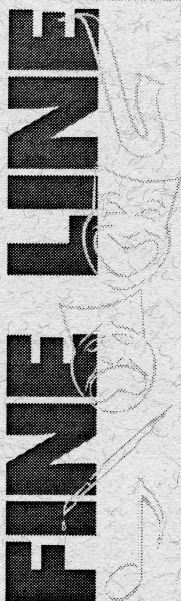

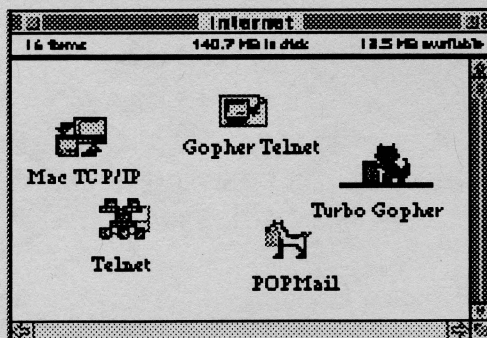
## **Stride for Excellence Scholarship**

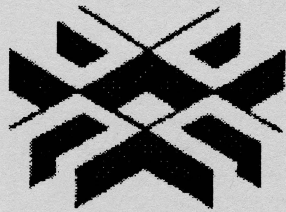

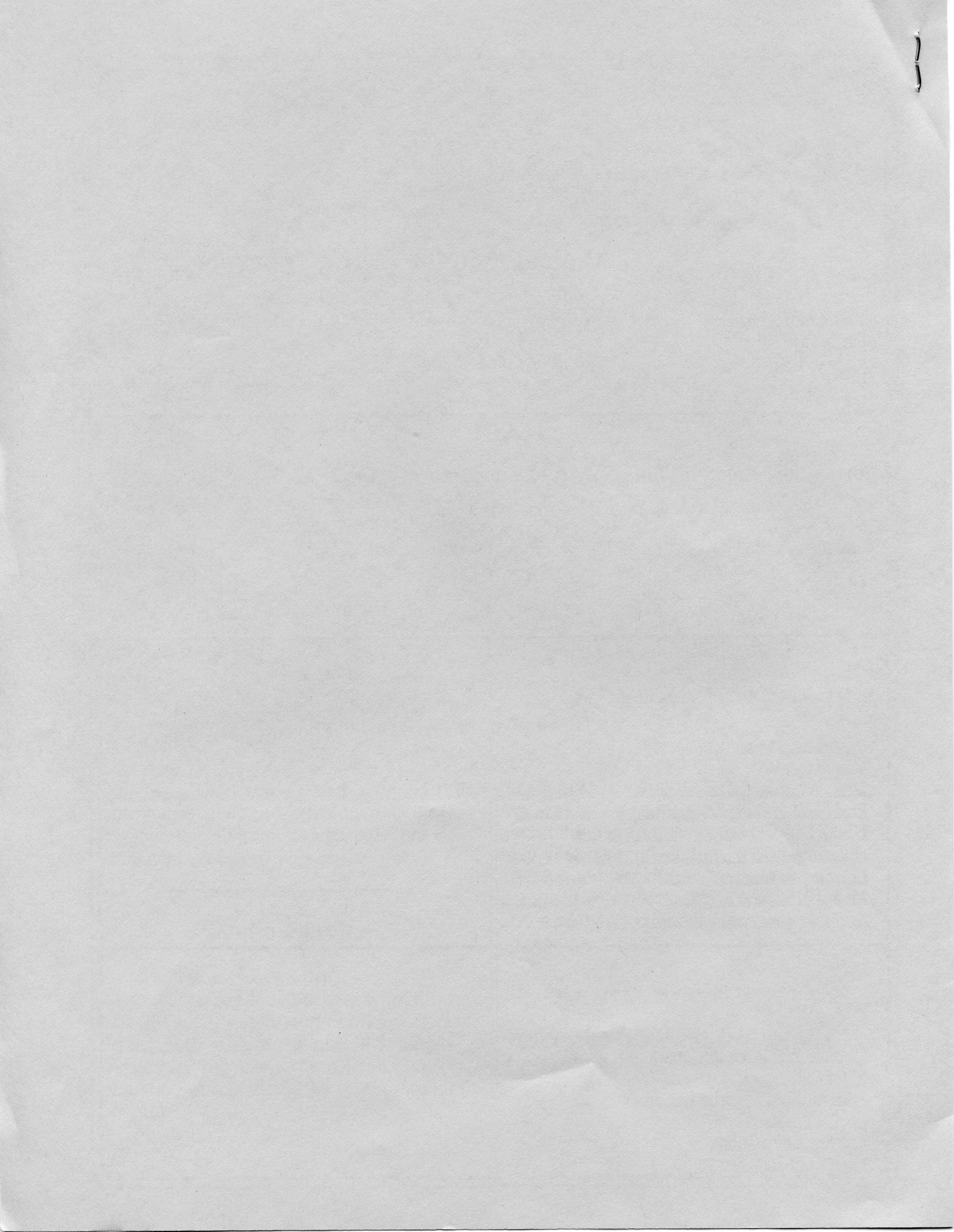

## Did You Know ?

Growth companies with university ties have productivity rates almost two-thirds higher than peers, and yet only four in ten forge these links, according to Coopers and Lybrand's *Trendsetter Barometer*. The growth companies using university resources have productivity rates 59 percent higher than companies not using university resources. This highly productive group had 21 percent higher projected annual reviews, 32 percent more recent bank loans and 23 percent more major capital investments planned in the next year.

"It is unfortunate that less than half of America's growth companies have developed these relationships, considering the substantial university-related resources that are available to them," says George Auxier, national director of entrepreneurial advisory services for Coopers & Lybrand L.L.P., the international professional services firm.

The survey found that growth companies hire students as interns and later as employees and noted that more than a third of these companies send their own employees to universities for training.

Faculty are employed as technical resources and aid in business planning and manufacturing technology.

Growth companies have cooperative research and development and use university laboratories or equipment.

"These firms are plumbing their relationships with universities to the fullest," says Auxier. "They recognize the benefits of participating in a wide spectrum of collaborative ventures and opportunistic alliances. By doing so, they not only enhance their businesses, but also the universities they team with."

It isn't a perfect situation yet though; challenges exist. The survey showed many concerns: faculty culture is not committed to a business collaboration, lack of active support in coordinating programs and resources for business, a technology or research focus is inappropriate for their business, a lack of expertise in working with growing companies, and course material is not appropriate for employee training or recruitment needs.

## CCCC Receives Award

CCCC has won the Georgianna award, named for Georgianna Elliot, the first woman to call for a place for women in American deaf instruction.

Winning this award is a tribute to CCCC's commitment to opening doors. CCCC hired six deaf people for the sign language program and sponsored Deaf Awareness Week (DAW), March 4-11. On March 7, CCCC held "It's a Deaf, Deaf World," which had a turnout of 230 people. CCCC helped coordinate the event, provided interpreting services, and encouraged student involvement.

Thanks to everyone who helped in this endeavor including Marianne Sasseen and especially our associate faculty members, Mark Branson, Sue Qualls, and Ritchie Bryant.

His \$3,000 grant will fund six weeks of self-directed study on "The Evolution of the 'Nature-Nurture' Debate: The Reciprocal Effects of Science and Society."
