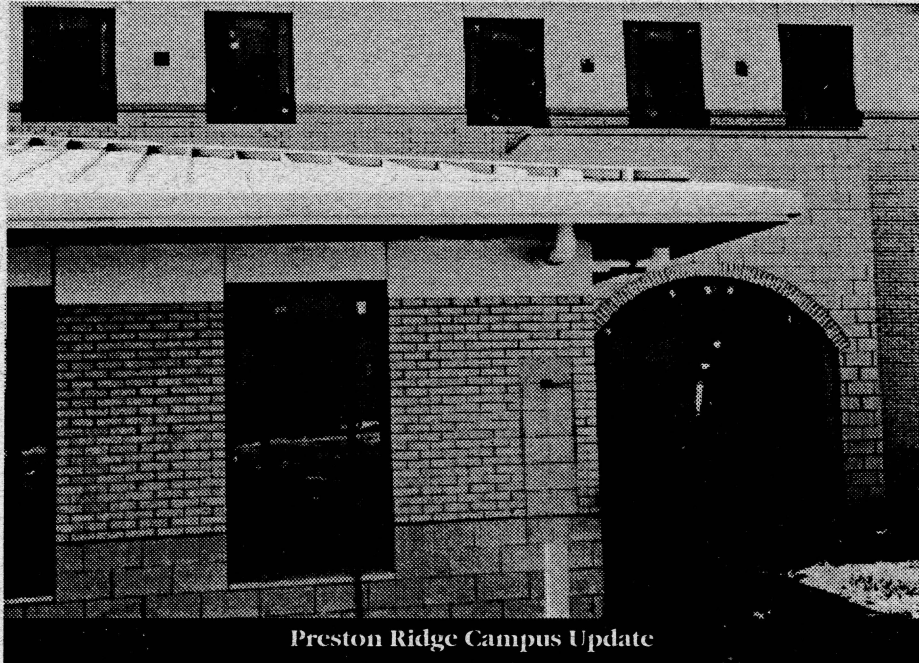

### Haley Presents

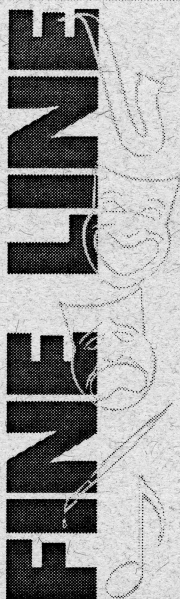

## Study in Europe

Join CCCC's study abroad program and spend the summer traveling and studying in Germany and Austria.

After a four-week introduction to the course work in German and music appreciation at SCC, 20 students and two faculty members will leave June 30 for Europe.

The itinerary includes a week in Vienna to explore the culture and history of Austria, followed by a train trip to Hirschegg, located in the Bavarian Alps near the Austrian border. Students will spend three weeks at the University of Marburg's vacation and study center. From there, students will combine course work with excursions to Lake Constance, Munich, the medieval city of Lindau, the famous royal castles of Ludwig II and other attractions.

The program is open to anyone eligible for enrollment at the college. Students earn up to seven credit hours in introductory or intermediate German and music appreciation. No prior language training is required.

The cost of the program is \$3,400, which includes air fare, transportation within Europe, lodging in dorm-style accommodation, all meals at Hirschegg, breakfasts in Vienna and Salzburg, excursions and entrance fees to museums and cultural events.

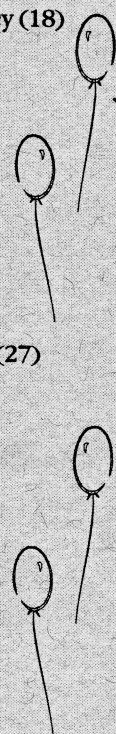
