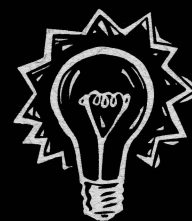
TRAFFIC LIGHT REQUESTED FOR PRESTON RIDGE

At the urging of CCCC administrators, the City of Frisco has requested a traffic study of the intersection of State Highway 289 and Wade Blvd. In a letter sent to the Texas Department of Transportation on Sept. 12, Frisco City Manager George Purefoy cited increased traffic at that intersection since the opening of Preston Ridge Campus. A traffic study is required to justify signal light construction.

State Highway 289, or Preston Road, is already quite congested, Purefoy said. The Department of Transportation plans traffic signals for SH 289 at Stonebrook/Rolater and SH 289 at Lebanon Road. Construction is expected to begin soon on those signals.

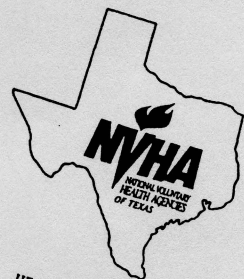

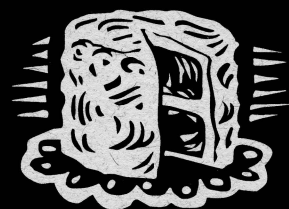
THE WRITE STUFF

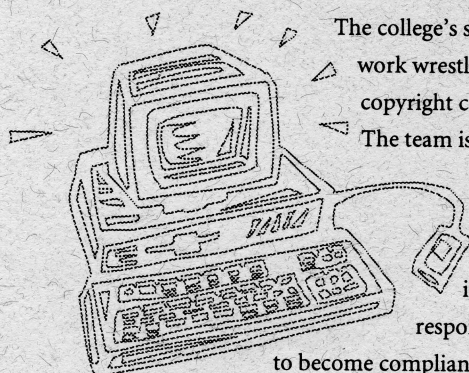

WHAT'S GOING ON WITH SOFTWARE COPYRIGHTS



The college's software copyright compliance team has been hard at work wrestling with developing and implementing software copyright compliance policies and procedures for the district.

The team is considering several approaches and addressing a multitude of details as it constructs a plan to ensure that the college and its employees are protected.

As the team strives toward a workable plan, it has at heart two concepts: 1) the college is responsible for providing employees with what is needed

to become compliant and 2) the college will NOT take the role of "big brother." These two concepts govern all discussions and considered alternatives as efforts are directed toward making the plan easily understood, implemented and followed.

NATIONAL DEPRESSION SCREENING DAY

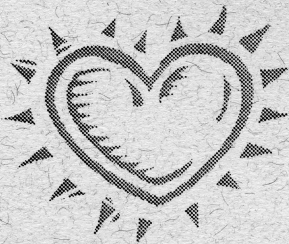
Thursday, Oct. 5
