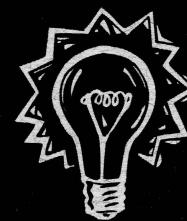

For the past two years, Amina El Ashmawy has served on the American Chemical Society's (ACS) 1995 General Chemistry Exam Committee. The committee included two-year college and university chemical educators from all over the country. The 1995 exam is available from the ACS Exams Institute for academic institutions. The ACS publishes exams for levels ranging from high school to graduate school.

Upon completion of this project, El-Ashmawy was asked to serve on the 1997 General Chemistry Exam Committee. In April she attended the 209th National ACS meeting in Anaheim, CA and worked with the exam committee on the upcoming exam. Two pilot exams will be drafted after the Biennial Conference on Chemical Education. The exam will be pilot-tested, drafted into its final form and published in early 1997.

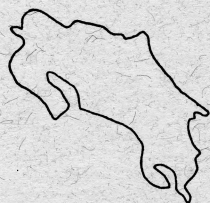

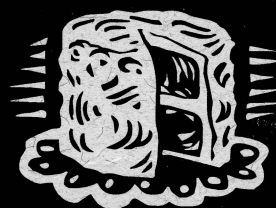

CCCC FACULTY DISPLAY PHOTOS

CCCC presents the annual Faculty Photography Exhibition Nov. 6 - 17. An opening night reception will be held from 6:30 - 8 p.m. Nov. 6 in the art gallery at SCC. The Photography Department faculty will present current personal work and specialty disciplines. Faculty members will be available at the exhibit for questions and comments.

• **June Van Cleef**, professor of photography, is presenting a series on relationships. Dr. John Anthony, CCCC president, and his daughter, Kim, are featured in this collection of photos. Van Cleef's images show CCCC employees in relation to a loved person, animal or object. "I try to play on visually contrasting elements," Van Cleef says. "These elements juxtaposed set up a contrasting tension of enjoyment." Van Cleef coordinated the Photography Department at CCCC in 1988 and is a nationally published commercial photographer.

• **Gary Bishop**, media coordinator, is mixing image and text. Bishop has published photos in nationally known magazines such as "Life" and "People." Bishop's photography classes contributed to a college publication which recently won first prize in a six-state competition.

• **Byrd Williams**, coordinator of the Photography Program, will address American violence with photographs of gunshot victims. "The artist has a job now: Who would look right straight at what we are except the artist," Williams says of his work. "We have a propensity for violence. I'm not taking sides on the gun issue. Actually, my work is more anthropology than art." Williams is incorporating his photographic images with text written by Larry Stern, professor of sociology at CCCC. The two teachers are jointly working on a book, "American Cultural Violence" that will be shown this November at Art Cologne, an international exhibit in Germany.

Additional photo topics include: fine art landscapes, multi-cultural backgrounds, small towns, digital images and a cultural examination of suburban childhood. When asked about this all-faculty exhibit, Williams said, "I am proud of the teachers in the photography program. They produce diverse and award-winning work. This show highlights the faculty, and there is no better way to know the quality of the teachers than to see their work." The exhibit includes images from many well known and published photography professors including Maryann Fittapaldi, David Glosson, Gina Hill, David Najjab, Jim Newberry, Robert Oliveri, Lee Owings and Angelique Sieniawski.

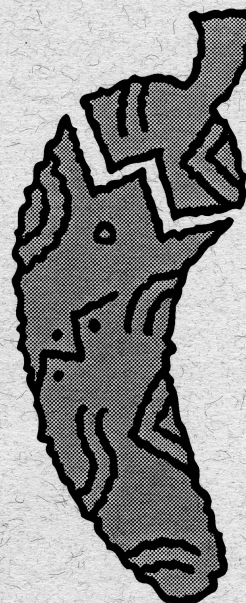
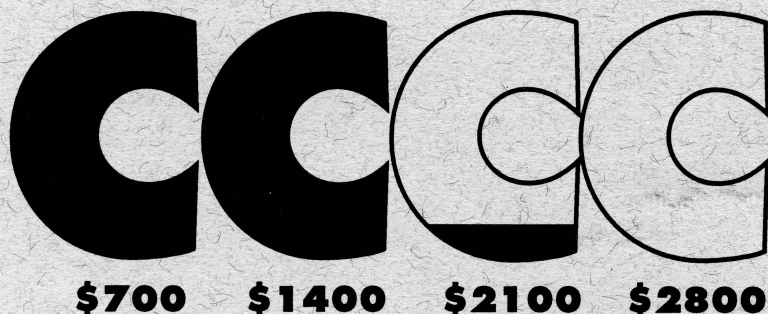
