AWARDS AWARDS AWARDS

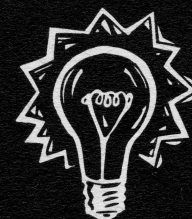
CCCC publications have garnered six major awards in recent months, including a prestigious Award of Excellence from the University & College Designers Association. Under the leadership of Dean of Enrollment Management & Marketing Toni Allen, the Public Relations and Publications Department also received five awards including four golds and one silver in 1995 Medallion Award competition, held by the National Council for Marketing & Public Relations. Public Relations Coordinator Lisa Tanner accepted the awards on behalf of the department during the NCMPR District 4 conference, held Oct. 1-3 in Denver.

CCCC was one of the big winners in the competition, which drew hundreds of entries from two-year colleges in Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and Wyoming. Winning publications were: Texas All Star Jazz Camp, best poster (Written by jazz studies professor Kris Berg, designed and illustrated by Art Director Mark Steele and produced by Dean of Fine Arts Mike Crawford); 10 Year report, best annual report (Written by former public information director Doug Wintermute, edited by Jack Gray and Toni Allen, designed by Mark Steele, produced by freelance production artist and CCCC grad Susan Stiff and photographed by Photography Coordinator Byrd Williams and photography professor Gary Bishop); CCCC viewpiece, most improved (Written by freelance writer Heather Darrow, with photography by Gary Bishop's media photography class, designed and produced by Mark Steele and Susan Stiff); CCCC print series, including catalog cover, student handbook cover, poster, postcard, pencil and T shirt, best public relations project (Designed by Mark Steele).

The 10 year report, honoring those who founded the college, also received an Award of Excellence from the University & College Designers Association. More than 1,200 entries from schools across the country were narrowed to 83 winners - two received gold awards, six silver and the remainder awards of excellence. CCCC was joined in the annual report excellence category by Indiana University and Penn State University.

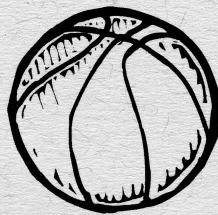

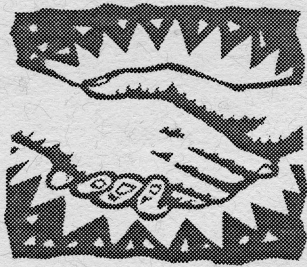

CCCC PREPARES FOR QUADRENNIAL REVIEW

CCCC's on-site review will run Weds., Nov. 15 - Fri., Nov. 17 (finishing just in time for the CPC Chili Cook-Off.) The on-site review team will consist of approximately ten members: six peer reviewers from different community colleges in the state and four THECB staff.

The on-site review process was developed by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) staff in the implementation of the new system for "State-level review of Texas' Community and Technical Colleges. The on-site review process was initially implemented in 1993 and is conducted on a four-year cycle. The focus of the system is: to identify institutional and programmatic strengths and concerns; to verify institutional outcomes and improvement efforts; to review compliance and improvement toward goals established by colleges in their Annual Reports and Carl D. Perkins annual and discretionary grant applications and to search for exemplary programs and innovative ideas. (Handbook for Administrative Team CTC On-Site Review)

The five critical success factors used to measure institutional effectiveness include mission, access, achievement, quality and effective use of resources. The primary evaluation focus is on: up-to-date curriculum; program enrollment; number, quality and employability of program graduates; student placement in employment, salary, and other follow-up results; program articulation linkages; assessment of competency-based curricula; progress towards SCANS workplace skills; input and activity of business and industry and membership and activities of advisory committees.

Program coordinators for technical programs, student development staff, and deans began meeting in early this year to prepare for the upcoming visit. If you have any questions, please contact Dr. Belinda Newman, the college's on-site review coordinator, at ext 6800.

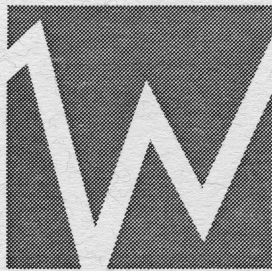
