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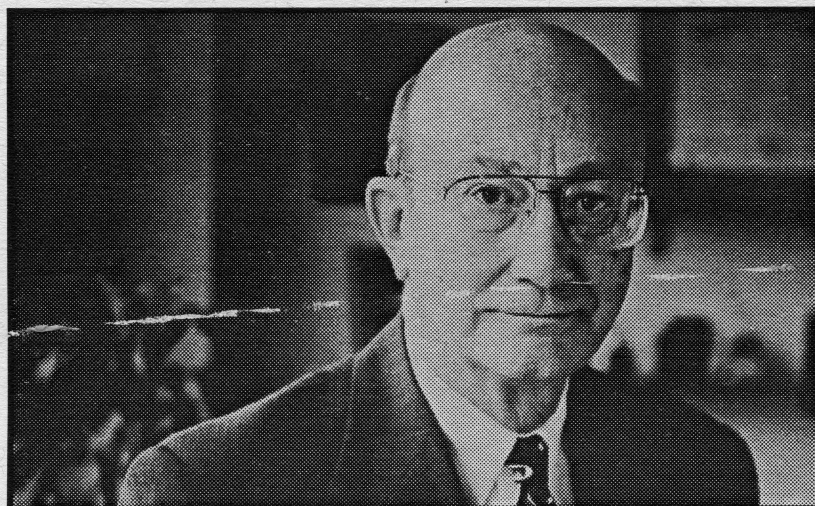

DR. ANTHONY ELECTED TO COMMISSION

Dr. John H. Anthony, Dr. Steve E. Ellis, and Dr. Tom Rodgers of CCCC took part in the 100th Annual Meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in Atlanta, Dec. 10-13. More than 2,500 delegates attended workshops and seminars on more than 100 topics, took action on accreditation issues, and set policy for the regional accrediting agency.

During the business session, Dr. Anthony, president of CCCC, was elected to the Commission on Colleges. The Commission on Colleges is responsible for the accreditation of the 786 colleges and universities under its jurisdiction, setting standards for accreditation and providing for approval and due process on all matters pertaining to accreditation.

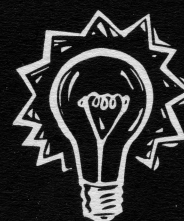
In celebration of the organization's centennial anniversary, delegates were treated to a reception on Sunday, Dec. 10, and keynote events featuring speakers Charles Kuralt, noted broadcast journalist, and Lester Thurow, global economist and author.

Accreditation is a non-governmental and voluntary process concerned with improving educational quality and assuring the public that member institutions meet established standards.

Delegates attending the annual meeting included faculty, administrators, and educational professionals representing the more than 11,000 accredited public and private institutions enrolling nearly 11 million students in universities, senior colleges, military schools, high schools, junior high schools, middle schools, elementary schools, and early childhood centers and kindergartens.

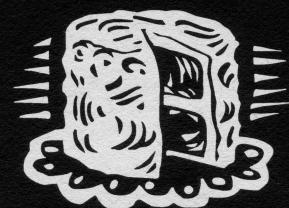

FACT

CCCC had the nation's first tech prep program in management development.

Some of you may have noticed the "Fact" in the last Kaleidoscope about the number of students Cooperative Work Experience serves each year. Yes! The fact is that in 1994-95, CWE employed 250 students in jobs related to their career choices. And...CWE served and does serve many more students every year in ways that assist them in developing a successful career path.

If you heard the Cooperative Work Experience "Give me a C!" commercial at All Staff Day, you may be able to recite the "Four- C's of Co-op" cheer. In case you didn't or you can't, here's a refresher in the Four-C's.

C is for career work experience. CWE's staff in job development meets with students daily to discuss occupational choices, work environments, skill building, academic directions, and employment trends while discussing the CWE course, its benefits and requirements. Last year an average of 87 students per month contacted the Co-op office to inquire about careers,

employment and credit through Cooperative Work Experience.

C is for cash income students receive for their work. Those 250 students earned a combined total of \$505,500 in their Co-op semesters last year. (The average wage earned by students in Co-op last year was \$7.90 per hour.)

C is also for cash that CCCC receives in state reimbursement for contact hours. At about \$900 per student, last year's

students brought \$225,000 in state funds. Plus, an estimated \$34,000 came to CCCC in tuition for Co-op courses along with the three-hour academic course requisite for Co-op eligibility.

C is for credit, three hours of academic credit as an elective (or outside elective) in a student's major. The 320 work hours are the learning focus for the 16 week course along with CWE professional development seminars which enhance their SCANS skills (CWE could have helped Dr. Ellis with his search for a definition). Presenters are business, industry, and specialized agency personnel who provide interactive sessions about self-management topics and corporate issues. These seminars are open to anyone in the college and the community. (Schedules are available at the CWE offices on all campuses).

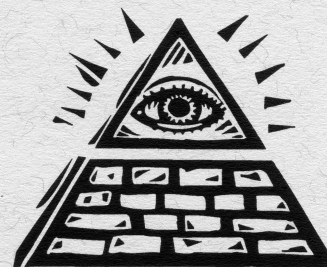
The fourth C is for Capstone Experience which is being required for community college graduates. The CWE course is an official Capstone Experience in the Coordinating Board guidelines and can assist instructional departments with student options.

The CWE Division staff is eager to promote this program to as many students as possible. Faculty and staff are encouraged to call for student referrals, class presentations, or faculty/staff departmental meetings. CWE has offices on all campuses which can be accessed through the SCC office at ext. 5735.

PROJECT NEW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

Applications are now available for women who'd like to participate in the inaugural class of Project NEW at Collin County Community College, according to Cathy Hurley, program coordinator.

Project NEW, the Network to Empower Entrepreneurial Women, is a grant-funded program to provide prospective women entrepreneurs with training to help them successfully launch their own businesses.

The first of four class cycles will premier March 4, 1996. The eight-week program is offered without charge to participants selected on a competitive basis.

Approximately 25 women will be selected to participate in each training cycle.

Those selected will complete the Women's Success Institute, a program that includes four required training modules and a series of elective seminars. Institute training will encompass about 50 contact hours.

In addition to the March 4 class, a second training cycle will begin in the fall of 1996.

Women interested in participating may request an application by calling ext. 3737 by Feb. 1. Funding for Project NEW has been provided by the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation Inc.

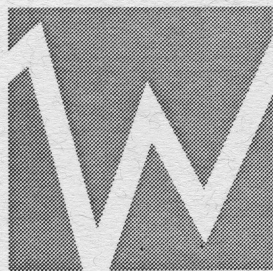
