the string of victories that in just ten years, has transformed him from a little-known economics professor into a leading figure in national politics.

Armey is well-known for his flat-tax proposal. Under this plan, all income would be taxed a flat 17-percent rate with no credits or deductions, except for generous personal exemptions for low-income earners and children. A family of four earning \$38,600 would pay no federal income tax. "You could pay your taxes on a form the size of a postcard," Armey says.

In 1994, Armey's north Dallas district reelected him with 77 percent of the vote. A native of Cando, N.D., he has worked at a grain elevator and as a telephone lineman. He holds a B.A. from Jamestown College, a master's from the University of North Dakota and a Ph.D. from the University of Oklahoma. He is a former chairman of the University of North Texas Economics Department.

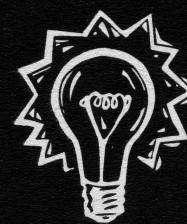

According to *The Wall Street Journal*, Congressman Dick Armey is "one of his party's most prolific and effective idea machines." His former colleague, Vin Weber, calls him "the one-man think tank in cowboy boots."

With his unanimous election as the first Republican House Majority Leader since 1954, Armey continued

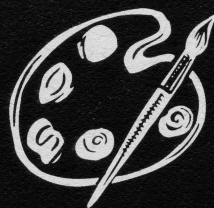

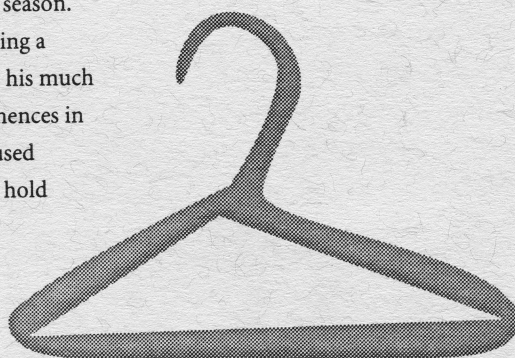

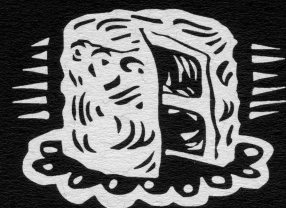
THANK YOU

The adult should make the student feel that he/she has a special friend. There is one group meeting per month, which may be a career discussion, service project or party. The mentor and student are also expected to meet one additional time per month. The adult should plan this meeting.

CCCC's Project SCORE

School and Community Offering Resources for Employment Adopt-A-Student Program

Connecting students to work-based experiences remains a critical issue for many programs across the state. Project SCORE's Adopt-A-Student program provides an excellent resource and benefit for students and professionals alike as 9-12th grade high school students are connected to the workplace. The Adopt-A-Student program links students with business, education and community leaders. This allows a student to gain insight into their career options. The program consists of three components:

1. **Mentoring-** Professionals who volunteer their time and guidance to students in grades 9-12.
2. **Job Shadowing-** Provides the opportunity for the student to observe the workplace environment and receive a realistic picture of the world-of-work.
3. **Internships-** Links students with paid/non-paid work opportunities in their chosen field of interest.

A. Career/Community Leadership Intern Program (CLIP)-

This program is a joint venture between Business and Community Partners,

McKinney Chamber of Commerce, McKinney Economic Development Corporation, Project SCORE, CCCC Cooperative Work Experience and Global EDGE Tech Prep. The non-paid internship provides a valuable opportunity for young people to gain a realistic insight into the world-of-work. Students increase self confidence and awareness of individual skills and abilities. This program is offered to students of the McKinney High School Career & Community Service Class, grades 11-12. Each intern spends approximately 2 afternoons a week at the worksite.

B. J.C.Penney Excellence Fund/Internship for Tech Prep Students- This program is a joint partnership between the J.C. Penny Company, Global EDGE Tech Prep Consortium, the CCCC Foundation and Project SCORE. The paid internship provides employment scholarships for current Collin County high school students who are enrolled in a Tech Prep class and provides work with a non-profit business, small business or a new business prior to graduation.

C. Internships/General- Student participants of Project SCORE, grades 9-12, are matched with employers who offer an appropriate activity for a student's planning process. New Consortium Logo and Motto

This issue of the Consortium Update marks the first newsletter appearance of our new Consortium logo and motto.

The motto, "Communicating, Cooperating, Collaborating," was approved by the Board of Directors at their August 11 meeting.

The logo was also approved by the Board of Directors at the preceding June 9 meeting. The design is the creation of **Jennie Schretter**, a student in the Applied Graphics Design Technology program at **Collin County Community College**. Students in Professor **Mark Steele's** Ad Agency class at CCC's Spring Creek Campus last spring proposed logo designs for the Consortium, and Jennie's was repeatedly selected as the favorite at various Consortium meetings and subsequently adopted by the Board. Jennie, a native of Cincinnati and a graduate of Miami University of Ohio, moved to Plano two years ago and is currently pursuing a degree in Collin County's AGDT program.

In an August 18 interview, Jennie commented as follows regarding her logo design: "I wanted to create something structural, something architectural, which would serve both as logo and as instant identification. I had been studying the designer Herb Lubalin in Professor Steele's class, and I suspect his work influenced my logo design. I hope the logo, with its lines and the arrangement of its words, conveys an impression of a building or structure with 'Consortium' as the foundation and support on which the edifice rises."

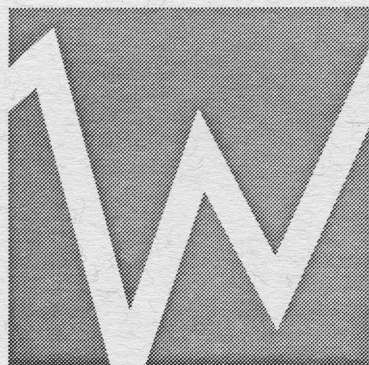
With the awarding of this money, the balance of SAFAC funds for the 1995-96 academic year is \$2,945.54. Copies of the
