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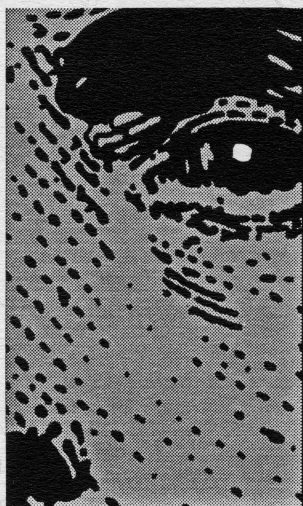

Fun CCCC Week

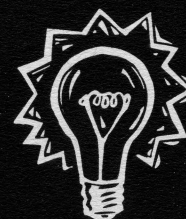
CCCC will host its third annual Fine Arts Week April 22-27 at SCC. The six-day event will showcase CCCC student work from each of the five divisions of the Fine Arts Department: applied graphic design technology, music, photography, visual art and theatre. Some of the events include a concert by CCCC jazz ensemble *Expressions*, the Quad C Theatre production *Picnic*, a percussion concert, recitals and numerous seminars, art exhibits and workshops.

SCC represents the center of Fine Arts for the CCCC district, as it houses three art galleries, the John Anthony Theatre as well as all of the Fine Art classes. In recent years, the college has experienced national and international recognition for its Fine Art-related activities, including this year's Quad C Theatre production of *Stand-Up Tragedy* which, after winning the Region VI competition (Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana and Arkansas), will compete in the National Finals of the American College Theatre Festival at the Kennedy Center for Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. This showcase determines the country's top collegiate theatre production.
