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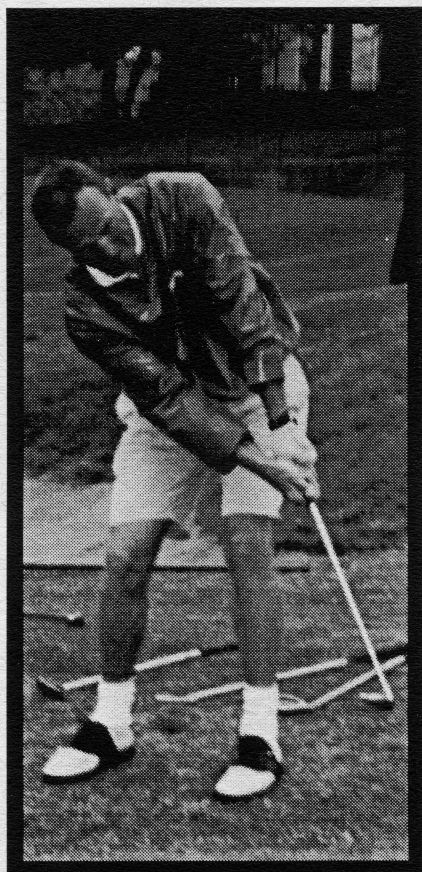

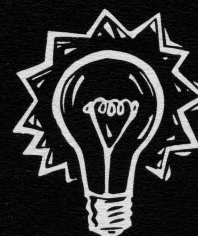
## **PAR EXCELLENCE-A SWINGING SUCCESS**

### Haley Featured

# **QUAD C THEATRE PRODUCTION GARNERS NATIONAL HONORS**

CCCC's production of *Stand-Up Tragedy* has gained top national honors, with 43 CCCC students and faculty travelling to Washington D.C. in April to perform at the John F. Kennedy Center for Performing Arts.

The play was one of five regional winners, selected from more than 1,100 productions nationwide, that advanced to the National Finals of the American College Theatre Festival. The other national finalists included the University of Southern California, University of Tennessee, University of Idaho and Boston University.

The Kennedy Center success caught the attention of representatives from the Pan Asian Repertory Theatre, who contacted Director Brad Baker about directing the

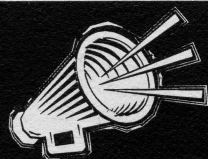
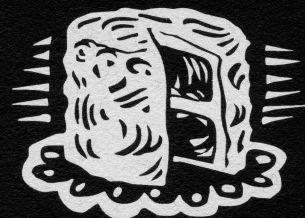

### **Middle School Programs**

It is never too early to start planning for college! In an effort to increase middle school students' awareness of the importance of education goals and to promote early college and career planning, the Recruitment and Retention Center has designed programs specifically for this age group. Since the Spring of '95, more than a dozen middle schools have participated. Several program formats are offered, but the most popular option is for the CCCC Recruiting Specialist to conduct class-hour length presentations at the middle school throughout a school day. Counselors usually recommend the eighth-grade audience, since it is during this year that students are making their academic plans for the next four years and most eighth-graders receive the results of their career assessments from the prior year. The class begins with an interactive group exercise using jungle survival as an analogy to

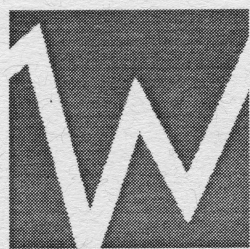
stimulate discussion and emphasize the importance of taking action now to plan for the future. This is followed with step-by-step guidance to optimize high school education, begin planning for college, make smart career choices and build a student resume.

Sometimes middle schools are able to bring their students to one of CCCC's campuses to spend a half day. Activities include a tour, a scavenger hunt and programs to enrich their current studies, like learning to conduct research in the LRC or attending a college class. After experiencing a fun day at a CCCC campus, students are more likely to return.
