

Scholarships Awarded

Diana Ramsower, Professor of Office Administration, was busy this spring interviewing high school seniors for scholarships. Hewlett-Packard Company asked her to help select the most qualified students that are dependents of Hewlett-Packard employees for national scholarships. This included employees in the Southwest division of the United States. She also took part in the scholarship selection for the Plano Independent School District's Outstanding Students Scholarships Awards. A total of 97 scholarships were awarded to deserving Plano seniors through this awards program.

CCCC Grants

Carl Perkins funded \$900 as a mid-year allocation to the ASPIRE Project. This project benefits displaced homemakers, single parents and single pregnant women and provides them with marketable skills promoting immediate entrance into the work force and encourages continued training to meet long-term career goals. The Alliance for Minority Participation funded \$27,250 to allow CCCC to participate in and contribute to the group's mission to increase the number of under-represented minorities receiving B.S. degrees in Natural Sciences and

Engineering. Carl Perkins funded \$12,500 as a mid-year allocation to Global Edge. The district's Tech Prep consortium offers high school students the opportunity to obtain college credit during high school which will fulfill degree requirements at CCCC. Carl Perkins also funded \$7,000 as a mid-year allocation to Formula Allocation for the enhancement of vocational /technical programs within the district.

Leadership Course Offered

Fundamental Theories in Community College Instructional Leadership will be offered by East Texas State University and the Department of Secondary and Higher Education. SHED 653 begins August 28 and meets Wednesday at 4 p.m. at SCC. This course provides an introduction to organizational theory, decision making and change theory. Practical applications of this theory will be studied and leadership strategies for the dean, division chair and department chair will be emphasized. The course should be transferable to any degree program in community college and higher education. The cost is approximately \$322. Register at ETSU's Mesquite or Commerce campuses. CCCC TO HOST ALL-STAR JAZZ CAMP

CCCC will host its second annual Texas All-Star Jazz Camp, led by CCCC's critically acclaimed professor of music Kris Berg. The camp is open to anyone age 13 or older who has at least one year of general experience with any instrument.

The day camp runs July 14-19 from 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. at SCC. The agenda includes hours of individual instruction from some of the nation's most renowned jazz figures.



"It's really a jazz fantasy camp. We bring in 15 of the country's best big band jazz musicians for an entire week," said Berg. "Students get to learn from them, play music with them and talk and rub shoulders with them."

Some of this year's faculty includes Kim Richmond, Kim Park, Clay Jenkins, Mike Vax and Gary Hobbs from the Stan Kenton Orchestra and Paul McKee and Jay Saunders from the Woody Herman Jazz Orchestra.

Faculty concerts will be held in the evenings throughout the week with one final student performance on the concluding Friday night. All concerts are free and open to the public. Camp admission is \$195 per person and registration is open until July 14, or until all spots are filled. For more information or to receive a registration poster, contact Kris Berg at ext. 5108.

ID CARD HOURS

Beginning the week of July 15 the ID card hours are: CPC- Room D110 Mon, Tues, Thurs, Fri 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Wed 8 a.m. - 8 p.m. PRC- Room F209 Tues & Wed 10 a.m. - 7 p.m. SCC- Room F130 10 a.m. -7 p.m. Each of the campuses will make Student IDs during on-site registration periods (regular and late registration) and during regular office hours in the first week of school each semester. Beginning the second week of classes, PRC and SCC will revert to making, reissuing and validating ID cards on Tues and Wed only from 10 a.m. - 7 p.m. Students, faculty and staff can always have their ID cards made, reissued and validated at CPC during the office hours listed above. Please remember that faculty and staff members must have received their first paycheck before an ID card can be made or reissued. The first ID card is free to faculty and staff; a reissue (replacement card if original is lost/stolen, requires a name change or an employee prefers a new photo) costs \$2. Students, faculty and staff must bring a valid photo ID to have their ID card made. Students must also bring a paid fee receipt for the enrolled semester.

CCCC EXCHANGE STUDENTS

Nine students from the University of Colima in Mexico will be attending summer school classes at CCCC as part of a newly developed exchange program. Six women and three men from Colima are enrolled in ESL classes for the Summer II term, which runs from July 10 - August 13, at SCC. Students will stay with volunteer host families in the area as they refine their English skills in conversation, grammar and American culture. The families provide room and board for the visiting students, and in turn receive insight-and oftentimes free Spanish lessons-to the Mexican culture. "I think its a marvelous opportunity for people in our community to learn the value of the culture of Mexico," said Gerry Perkus, professor of English and the man responsible for this exchange program. CCCC's relationship with Colima, initiated by Perkus, exemplifies a true exchange program as eight U.S. students from Collin County will travel there to study for the upcoming fall semester. Dealing with Tough Customers

Our students are our customers. Using empathy is helpful when communicating with customers who have a problem according to Rick Kirschner, co-author of "Dealing with People You Can't Stand." "The first step is making sure you don't take [problematic] behavior personally. Understand what really makes that person feel threatened so you're in a position to deal with their behavior," Kirschner mentions in Entrepreneur magazine. He also recommends the following tips: Listen. Your attention is vital to soothing the customer, plus the feedback is vital to your success. Try to analyze and understand what the customer really wants: a refund, an apology or a credit, for example. If you must enforce unpopular policy, like a state regulation, prepare yourself and your staff to patiently explain why. Accommodate even seemingly unreasonable demands if possible to keep your customer happy. ...from Entrepreneur magazine.
