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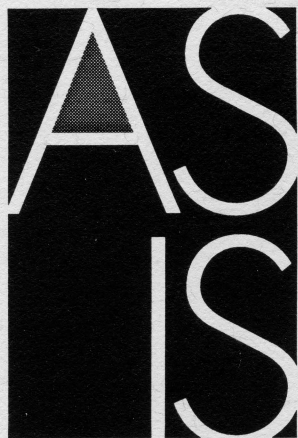

Theatre Opening to Include Interactive Discussion, Silent Auction

CCCC will open its '96-97 theatre season in bold fashion with the performance of William M. Hoffman's dramatic hit play, *AS IS*, Broadway's first play to focus on the deadly AIDS virus. And in honor of the play's theme, Quad C will host an interactive AIDS awareness discussion following each production of the play as well as a silent auction fundraiser during each showing.

Winner of the 1985 Obie and Drama Desk Award, *AS IS* details the impact of the AIDS virus in modern-day relationships by depicting the bravery and compassion in which two people face the shattering reality that one of them has been infected with the deadly virus. The show runs at 8 p.m. Oct. 10-12 and 17-19, with matinee performances at 2:15 p.m. on Oct. 13, 19 and 20. A special matinee will also be performed at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 16. All shows are performed in the John Anthony Theatre.

Immediately following each of the shows, Quad C will host a post-show discussion about many of the issues surrounding AIDS in today's world. The discussion will be interactive with patrons of the show and will be moderated by AIDS educators from Collin and Dallas Counties.

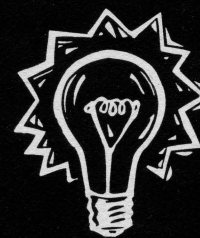
The Quad C Theatre students have also sponsored a multi-item silent auction to benefit AIDS education and hospice care. Numerous national celebrities have graciously donated items that will be up for bid to help the students reach a goal of \$10,000. The items include autographed scripts from authors like Mark Medoff, autographed memorabilia from stars Rosie O'Donnell, Spike Lee, Rob Reiner, Billy Joel and Wynonna Judd and autographed sports items from former Rangers pitcher Nolan Ryan, NFL quarterbacks Troy Aikman, Dan Marino and John Elway and numerous others. Many local businesses have also donated coupons and/or merchandise that will be up for bids. The auction is open to the public (no theatre ticket is required) for bids before, during and after each showing of *AS IS*.

Quad C Theatre director Brad Baker, who in the past four years has helped CCCC capture almost every award imaginable for collegiate theatre, says that the silent auction was entirely the students' idea. "This is a rare and passionate group of socially aware young artists who are daring to make an impact with their art," he said.

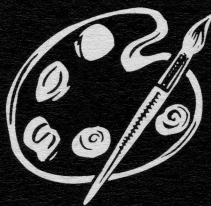

Student Responsibility Workshops for Educators

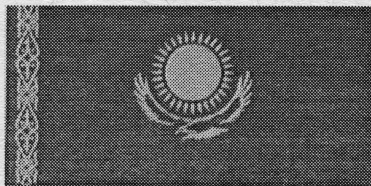

"The new flag of Kazakhstan was adopted in June 1992, the year after the breakup of the USSR. On the sky-blue field is a golden sun and a soaring eagle, and in the hoist is a vertical stripe described as the "national ornamentation." The blue field represents the sky, and the sun and the eagle stand for the lofty aspirations of the Kazakhstan people. 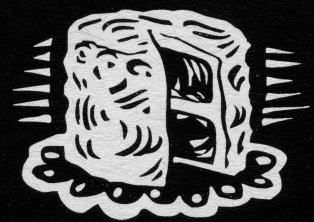
Geography Quiz
