PTK GRANT

HIGH-TECH CLASSES WIN PTK GRANT

CCCC's high-tech semiconductor manufacturing and telecommunications programs have been awarded a grant funded by Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society of two-year colleges.

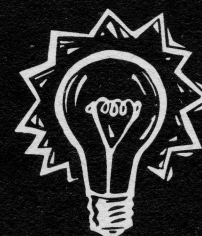
The college was selected for participation in the national "Improving Science and Technology Education at Community Colleges" project and will attend the corresponding first-ever National Science and Technology Education Conference in Washington D.C.

Three faculty members, Joe Hackney, coordinator of electronics and semiconductor programs; John Baltzer, associate dean of engineering technology and Carolyn Primeau, curriculum director for engineering technology, who also wrote CCCC's grant proposal, traveled to Washington recently and gave a presentation demonstrating the implementation of technology in math and science programs.

CCCC was one of 17 two-year colleges selected from more than 100 grant proposals submitted nationwide. As a result of its selection for the prestigious project, the college will receive mentoring services for the semester following the National Science Conference to assist in applying improvements in science, math, engineering and technology to each of Quad C's campuses, as well as guaranteed participation in next year's Conference.

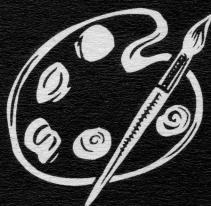
NEW FILM WRITING COURSE

CCCC CHORAL STUDENTS MAKE NATIONAL HONOR CHOIR

Four CCCC students were recently named to the prestigious American Choral Directors Association National Honors Choir and traveled to San Diego for the ACDA national convention March 5-8.

David Kasko of Plano, Jennifer Lavery of Allen, Kristin Richmond of Plano and Shelia Swenholt of Plano are all members of the Collin County Chorale, CCCC's performing choir. The foursome was selected by audition tapes sent in during the fall semester to be part of the 180-member ACDA Honors Choir that consists of America's finest two-year college choral students.

The ACDA national convention is held every two years and attracts more than 5,000 choral directors from colleges, universities, churches and civic organizations around the country. During the convention, the choir performed two concerts under the direction of guest conductor Dr. William Hatcher, director of choral activities at the University of Iowa.

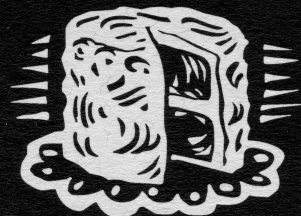

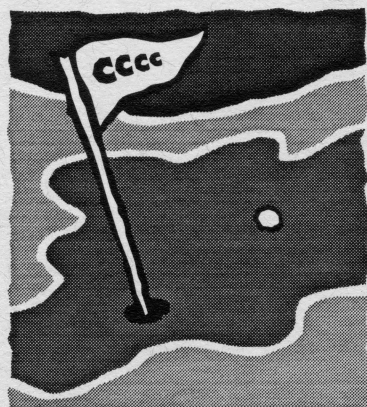

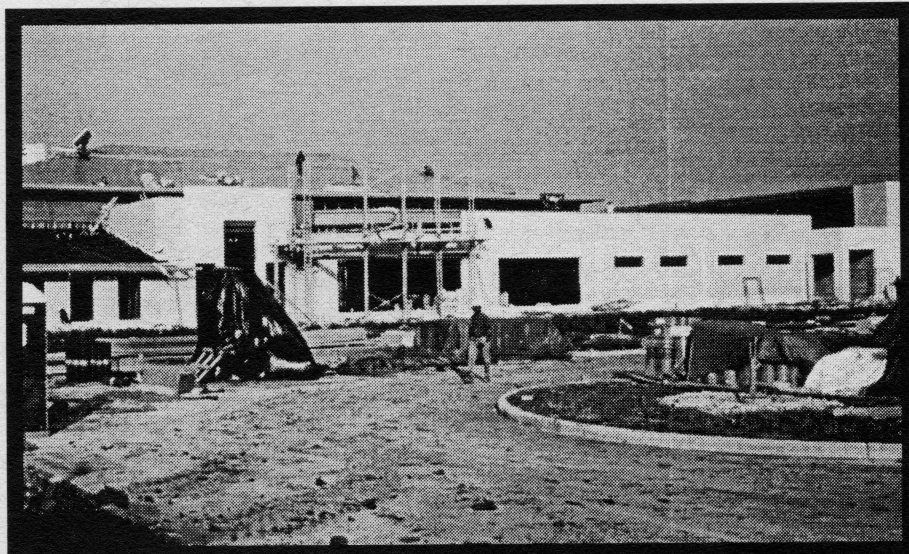

TAXES FILED BY PHONE

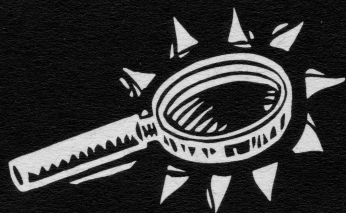
For many students, filing a federal tax return may be easier than ever. Check your stack of mail and look for a special booklet with a purple telephone on the cover. If you have one of those special tax packages, you may be able to file your tax return by phone. That's right - touch-tone telephone. It takes less than 10 minutes and it can be done anytime of the day or night, seven days a week. Elect Direct Deposit and your tax refund will be in your bank account in a few days.

In 1996, after expanding nationwide for the first time, 246,223 Texans used TeleFile. IRS research showed that one-third of TeleFilers last year were students. TeleFile is quick, easy and free. After you enter information from your W-2 forms using a touch-tone pad phone, TeleFile automatically figures tax refund. After calling in your tax return, don't forget to keep your booklet. The worksheet can be used as an official document, including applications for financial aid.

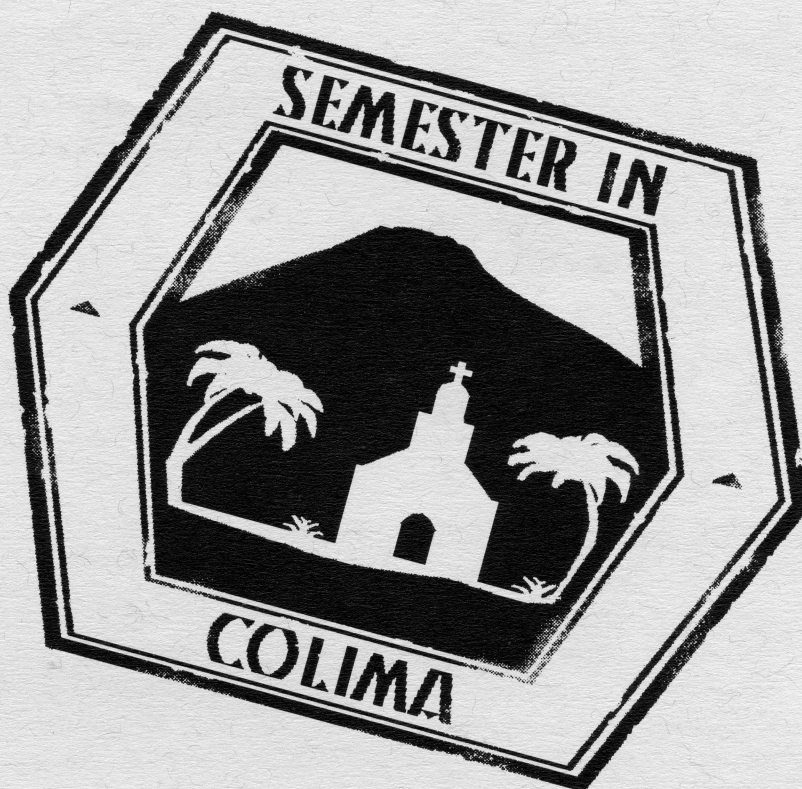

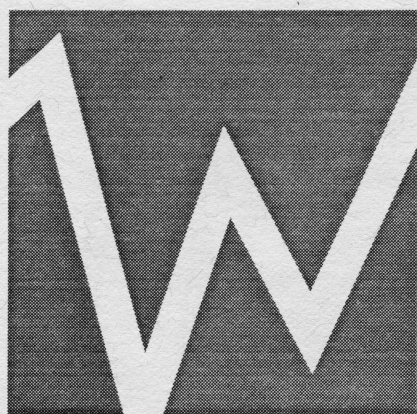
COLIMA EXCHANGE PROGRAM

THREE EXPRESS PLAYERS NAMED TO ALL-CONFERENCE LIST

In spite of both the men's and women's teams just missing the post-season tournament, three basketball players from Collin County Community College were recently named to the North Texas Junior College Athletic conference (NTJCA) all-conference team for '96-97. Sophomore guard Angie McCloud of Merit Bland High School, who was a preseason all conference selection, and freshman point guard Shauka Scales of Garland were named to the NTJCA first team. Freshman forward Sheryce Jacobs of West Mesquite was named to the women's honorable mention team. McCloud, who had a solid freshman season at 9 points a game a year ago, averaged 10.6 points per contest in '97 and was the catalyst in many of CCCC's come-from-behind wins this season. She also set school records in assists (108) and most three point shots made (61). Scales was an impressive performer all season long for the Express and finished as the no. 12 scorer in the league at 14.3 points per game. Jacobs was also a key component for the Lady Express, averaging 12.9 points (tied for eight-best in the conference) and 10.3 rebounds (fourth in the league) a game. After starting the season a dismal 0-9, the Lady Express finished the year at 12-18 and a respectable 8-8 in conference play. The men's squad jumped out to their best start in school history at 11-3 and ended the year at 19-9 overall and 9-7 in the NTJCA. Both teams finished fifth in the conference and were in the hunt for playoff births until the last week of the season.
