MCKINNEY, TEX.--The first annual meeting of the Collin County Community College District Foundation Board was held, Tuesday, May 2 at the Conference Center of the Spring Creek Campus.

Board members approved guidelines for scholarships to be awarded to special populations including disabled, minority and single parent/homemakers.

Two trustee merit-based scholarships were also approved for students with exceptional academics and leadership capabilities.

The April financial statement was read and a balance of \$63,998 was approved.
